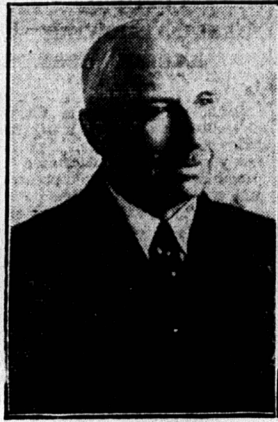

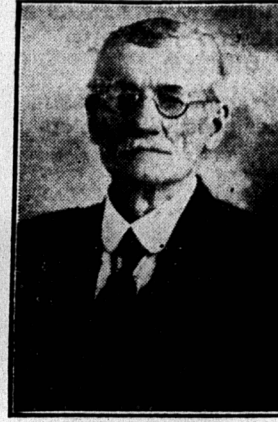

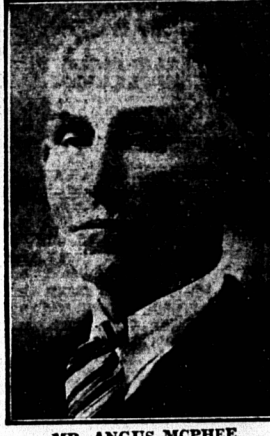

Leaders Needed "I stated to you last year that this movement needs leaders to direct it along proper channels and to make it successful," Hon. Mr. McCulligan continued. "Who are better qualified to lead than our teachers? I think it was John Bright, an English statesman, who said, 'You should link yourself with a great cause; you may never do the cause very much good but the cause will do you a great deal of good.' We have right in our midst, a great cause and I will conclude by asking the teachers to get behind this great cause, so that we may have in this fair province of ours a truly educated citizenship."

Administrative Units Discussing larger units of administration Mr. Shaw told teachers that he believed it would be an extremely difficult change to bring about. Opposition of the people to give up their little control was an extremely difficult thing to bring about. One of the things the adult education groups should discuss was "what should a farmer's education be?" Mr. Shaw believed. Evening Session Between 200 and 250 adult study clubs had been organized in the province, Dr. J. T. Croteau told the teachers last night. They were scattered from East Point to Tignish. In several districts practically every adult in the community was a member of the study club. "Adult education has come to the province to a greater extent than many of us realize," Dr. Croteau said. Proper co-operation on the part of the teachers in the adult education movement would lead to security of tenure for the teacher, the speaker declared. It would also stimulate the social life of the community. In an interesting illustrated lecture Mr. Tufts dealt briefly with about 15 common water birds. The Prince Edward Island birds. The lecturer also showed two films, one featuring the work of the famous Canadian Indian naturalist, Grey Owl, with the beavers and the other dealing with Canadian bird life and entitled "Here and there with the birds of Canada." A., Wolfville, N.S., chief migratory bird officer for the Maritime Provinces. The program was changed considerably at the evening session because of the late arrival of the train on which Mr. Tufts was traveling. The reports of the C.T.F. delegates, Miss Bessie McLeod of Charlottetown and Miss Ethel Tanton of Summerside were heard and an address on "The place of the teacher in the adult education movement" by Dr. J. T. Croteau, Mr. E. J. H. Morrissey of Queen Square School also spoke briefly on credit unions. At the morning session Mr. R. H. Rogers spoke briefly soliciting the co-operation of the teachers in the annual Red Cross financial campaign scheduled for next month. Lt. Col. K. S. Rogers spoke on the Y.M.C.A. Hobbies Exhibition, urging teachers to co-operate in bringing out the creative instincts in their pupils. That was the principal function of the exhibition, he declared.
