A HALIFAX paper says:—The apple crop of the Annapolis Valley, is not likely to be as large as it gave promise to be earlier in the season. In the review of the fruit growing industry which our Canning correspondent gives, it is pointed out that the severe frost in June, has reduced the earlier estimate and the damp and cold weather of the past month may somewhat injure the quality. The present outlook, however, is that there will be an average yield of apples, one exporter estimating the crop in the Annapolis Valley at half a million barrels, about the same as the yield in 1903.

The Somerville, Mass Journal has a tribute to the memory of the late Miss Leona M. Gay, daughter of Oswald and Mrs. Gay, formerly of Charlottetown and grand-daughter of Edward Wood, Pownal. The Journal says:—Miss Leona M. Gay died of heart failure yesterday at the home of her father Oswald Gay, 50 Pinckney street, after a week's illness, at the age of seventeen years. The funeral services will be held Sunday at 2.30 p. m. in the Perkins-street Baptist church, Cross street, near Pearl. Miss Gay was a member of the chorus choir, a teacher in the intermediate department of the Sunday school, an active worker in the Young People's union, and for two years a member of the church. A singularly gentle and gracious spirit, she had endeared herself to a large circle of young people who will share the sorrow of the immediate family over her sudden and premature decease.

POSTAL cards with certain pictures on them have recently been prohibited in several countries. In Russia all cards bearing the portrait of Tolstoi are destroyed; in Turkey no card bearing the name of Allah or Mahomet, the photograph of the Kaaba or the portrait of a Mohammedan woman, is allowed to go through the mail; in Saxony all postal cards are prohibited which refer in any way to a recent adventure of Princess Louise; in Portugal the postal officials have been instructed to destroy any card which is designed to cast ridicule on the king on account of his corpulence; in France strenuous efforts are constantly being made to keep out of circulation picture postal cards which are an offense to good taste; and, finally, all cards referring to the late Queen Draga Machin and to Prince Henry of Holland have been prohibited.

ON the evening of July 4, at Stewiacke, Colchester County, at their home, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Johnson celebrated the 50th anniversary of their marriage. In the absence of the Baptist pastor, Rev. J. B. McLean presided, giving an able address which was responded to briefly by Mr. Johnson. Dimock Archibald of Amherst, the oldest living brother of Mrs. Johnson spoke briefly. The presents, including a purse of gold, told of intelligent loyal affection. The seven children, all living, and twenty-one grandchildren, were well represented in this happy company. Due credit was given to the mother's great mission in teaching and training the five daughters and two sons, those noble principles which are so well exemplified in the Christian character of each one of them. Similar reference was made to Mr. Johnson's life long effort to teach the evils of intoxicating drink and tobacco, and of his own life in harmony with his teachings; also of his spending twenty-five years as colporteur, in the past five years of that period selling books for Dimock Archibald, who at that time conducted a business of Prince Edward Island, afterwards for 20 years in the employ of the B. A. T. & B. Society, of Halifax. One lesson for our young people from Mr. Johnson's life and example, is, that great talents may not be necessary in order to achieve real success in life, but great perseverance in using what talent we have, is necessary. It was a joyous reunion, the effects of which will not soon be forgotten.—Truro News.
