Egg And Poultry Grading Short Course Concluded

The Egg and Poultry Grading Short Course sponsored by the Federal and Provincial Youth Training program was completed recently. The Course was in charge of Mr. F. M. Nash, Senior Poultry Fieldman, Dominion Department of Agriculture, assisted by Messrs J. B. Arsenault and C. E. Sampel, Charlottetown, and Mr. Merrill Mitchell, Ottawa. This course consisted of complete training in egg and poultry grading both from the standpoint of theory and practice. Lectures were also given on better production methods. Eggs were graded according to the Canadian Standards, as well as the interior quality measured by standards set by the National Research Council. Numerous applications were received for the course, but due to the nature of instruction it was impossible to accommodate more than 39. Consideration was shown applicants who had some possibility of securing employment providing they were successful in receiving a certificate of qualification in this work.

On the completion of the course, examinations were held, both written and practical. Students were required to make 70 percent. The following will receive a certificate certifying that the successful student has passed an examination conducted by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, has demonstrated his ability to grade eggs according to the Canadian Standard Egg Grading Act and as a Certified Egg Grader. Grads Hear Address By Mr. Richard Davis

A special Easter supper meeting was held on Wednesday by the Holy Y. Grad Club. The speaker of the evening was Mr. Richard Davis, personal secretary of the Y. M. C. A. National Council. Other guests were Mr. Eranwell Chaudier, Mr. Gordon Camp, Mr. Albert Dennis, and Mr. J. R. Compton. After supper the Grads made good use of the new Club songbook; Mr. Camp sang several solos accompanied by himself with his guitar and by Mr. Dennis at the piano; and Mr. Compton gave two readings which were heartily applauded.

The chairman then introduced the guest speaker. As a preface to his remarks, Mr. Davis complimented the Club on its fine spirit of camaraderie. He explained that he had spent a year travelling in Europe and that he would outline briefly the ideologies of France, Germany, and Russia before showing his motion pictures taken in those countries. In the course of his address, Mr. Davis enumerated four challenges which he believed to be the basic questions of our generation: International anarchy versus international organization - Each in-

tion, the speaker declared, wants to be a law unto itself and if that continues, civilization will surely be destroyed. Said to say, the League of Nations has not been able to solve this problem.

Democracy versus Dictatorships - The speaker said that Canada has a happier atmosphere, but still Canadians must not take democracy for granted. Today it is on trial for its life. Germany says that our system of government lacks efficiency and discipline. Russia states that political democracy without economic democracy is just like seaweed. There is no substance to it.

Socialism versus Capitalism - Mr. Davis, in dealing with this phase, assured his audience that he did not wish to take sides. He said that there were no middlemen and no profiteers in Russia. The factory or farm operates as long as the need is there, whether profit is being made or not. Hand in hand with socialism, Capitalism has solved the problem of production, but not of distribution. The capitalist system has not learned to handle distribution when things are plentiful, and unless it can solve this problem it must give place to a system that can.

The fourth problem which Mr. Davis dealt with was Religion versus Atheism. He said that in Germany and Russia the government lures people away from the church. These people pay not even lip service to religion. The German criticizes Christianity on the ground that it is Jewish and not virile enough. That is why they are reviving the cruel, but brave, old Nordic religion. The Russians, on the other
