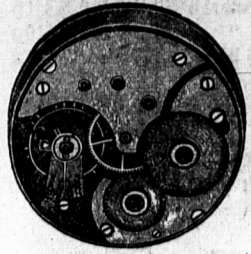

A PROMINENT dealer told the St. John Globe that advices from New York state that sugar sold there Wednesday for January and February delivery at one-eighth of a cent higher than the previous sales. Montreal refiners Wednesday advanced their price on all grades of refined sugar ten cents per hundred pounds. It is almost a certainty that a local advance will be made. The Acadia Sugar Refining Co. of Halifax followed this advance at 3.30 Thursday afternoon with an increase also of ten cents on all grades of refined sugars. The increase in price, therefore, since November first has been fifty five cents per hundred pounds, and it is expected that there will be further advances until it is possible that this staple may reach as high a figure as prevailed twenty years ago, when refined sugars sold for about ten cents per pound retail.

The death occurred at Ebenezer on Oct. 20th of James S. Seaman, one of the best known residents of that place, aged 30. Deceased had been in falling health for some time past, but up to a few hours of his death was around as usual. In his early manhood he was a blacksmith by trade and later engaged in farming. The recollections of Mr. Seaman are those of kindness, affection and charity, an upright and hospitable neighbor, loved and respected by everyone. His demise will be long felt in his late home where he leaves a sorrowing wife and one son to mourn a loving husband and affectionate father, to whom The Guardian extends its sincere sympathy. The remains were followed by a large number of friends and neighbors to their resting place in St. John churchyard cemetery. Rev. F. B. Reigh performed the obituary both at the house and the church where he spoke feelingly of his intimacy with his departed friend. The members of the L. O. O. Foresters, Court Wiltshire of which Mr. Seaman was a member had their service at the grave.

**PROF. ROBERTSON'S NEW POSITION**

Will Take Charge of Agricultural College and Experimental Farm.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—Professor Robertson, commissioner of agriculture and dairying, whose resignation was reported some days ago, will take effect from the first of the year. It is not intended to fill the position. The work will be re-arranged so that the present staff will cover it. Mr. Ruddick, who is assistant dairy commissioner, will no doubt be placed in charge.

Mr. Robertson is going to take charge of a large agricultural college and experimental station which is to be established at St. Anne de Bellevue, near Montreal, by Sir William McDonald, the Montreal millionaire. Professor Robertson will have full control. There will be classes in scientific agriculture, and also a department for original research.

The college will be located on a seven hundred acre farm, which will be available for practical demonstrations. Sir Wm. McDonald has already purchased the Reford farm and some adjoining properties for the purpose.
