FRACTURES HIP IN FALL ON CITY STREET

Mr. Lawrence Gaudet, 73-year-old veteran of the Boer War and later in the World War, was suffering a fractured hip when he slipped and fell on the slippery street opposite the Market yesterday morning. He was crossing Queen Street after visiting the market when he suddenly slipped on the ice and fell heavily to the street. Some passers-by picked him up and took him to his home. Later in the day he was removed to the Charlottetown Hospital where he was reported to be "resting comfortably" last night. He is a native of this city and served as a soldier in the Boer War and later in the World War.

VICTIMS OF BOMBS

The war came home directly to Amherst Monday when Mrs. F. B. Mylrea, Spring Street, received the sad word that members of her own immediate family were victims of a German bombing raid. Her mother, Mrs. A. Gomez was killed as was a sister Miss Acelo Gomez, while a second sister Miss Elena Gomez was seriously injured, and is now receiving hospitalization. Particulars of the tragedy were limited as only the meagre facts of the actual tragedy were contained in the cablegram. It was only a few days ago that Mr. Mylrea had received word that a nephew was drowned in the sinking of the H. M. S. Margaree. Mrs. Mylrea will have the sympathy of her many friends in Amherst over this sad bereavement. Amherst News. TELEPHONE MEETING

The annual meeting of the North Wiltshire Telephone Company was held in North Wiltshire hall. The President E. N. Easter occupied the chair and Secretary-Treasurer, G. E. Noye read the minutes of previous meetings which were adopted. Mr. Noye in his genial way gave a report of revenue and expenditure showing a cash surplus of \$70.00 deposited in the Royal Bank at Hunter River to the company's credit. The number of shareholders present showed their appreciation of Mr. Easter's and Mr. Noye's financing by not one dissenting voice during the meeting.

The following shareholders representing North Wiltshire and Hampshire were present: Wm. Easter, Berrigan Bros., Leonard Bowman, Wm. Clark, Roland Easter, Frank Easter and John Clark. Owing to the time needed much new repairs Section 6 of the by-laws was altered. In the second line the word three was changed to five dollars and the word two in the sixth line to four dollars. This change will only be an increase of fifty cents per year to boxholders as it is the intention of the management to furnish each box-holder with one set of new batteries each year. The President who is responsible not only to the shareholders but to the P. E. Island Telephone Co. for the management of this line explained at this meeting that shareholders' connecting lines had to be repaired immediately as there were many complaints from the telephone Co. and Central and were liable to be disconnected at Milton any day.

The War This Week

Italy's ability to continue in effective partnership with Germany underwent marked deterioration in the 65th week of the war, causing Berlin to caution its allies to limit events in the Mediterranean has posed a serious problem for the Axis.

German diplomacy itself had a none too happy week, finding itself self forced to withdraw previous confident expectations that Bulgaria would be signed to the Axis, and Rumania, Hungary and Slovakia had the previous week in Rumania, Iron Guard anarchy culminating in the slaying of scores of prominent figures in the old regime made a poor advertisement for the "order" the Nazi influence is said to exert.

The Royal Navy, with the fleet air arm playing a prominent role, is hard at the Italian fleet, inflicting damage in an action off Sardinia on a battleship, three cruisers and two destroyers. British bombers chased off a flotilla of Italian destroyers attempting to land the Greek island of Corfu at the entrance to the Adriatic, while naval and R.A.F. bombers carried out attacks on Italian supply ports in Albania, southern Italy and Sicily.

The Greek advance in Albania continued steadily and correspondents who reached the front line reported back that the Greek claims of territory gained, prisoners taken and supplies captured, far from being exaggerated, have been extremely modest.

An official statement in Washington described Italy's economic position as serious, with the British blockade having prevented the importation of foodstuffs and raw materials sorely needed to carry the country through the winter. Berlin's concern at this situation led to a press dispatch from the German capital where it was asked how Italy, reduced already to four meagre days a week, will get through the winter.

Britain herself was anxiously concerned with her own supply problems. Officials candidly admitted that British shipyards are finding themselves unable to produce sufficient new ships to replace the tonnage sunk by German submarines and aircraft. Indications were that Britain will lean more heavily on North American aid.

Glancing back 25 years: In the last week of November, 1915, Sir Charles Townshend's division was fought at Kut-el-Amar, 18 miles after reaching a point 18 miles from Baghdad. German operations in Serbia ended when communications between Bulgaria and Turkey were cut off by the advance of Serbian and Anglo-French forces toward the Greek border.

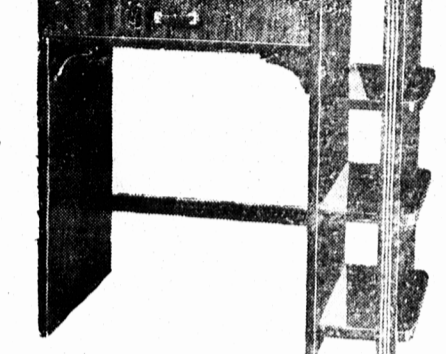

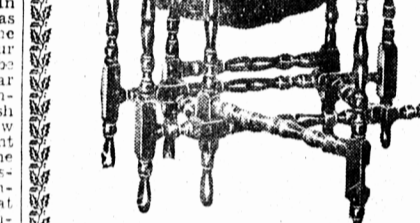

Patriotic Greeks Give Their All

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 28 — George Pappageorge is a native son of Greece who for many years has been a watchman for the Canadian National Railways near Hope, B.C. Thursday, listening to a news broadcast he heard how Sperio Paddis, 70 year old, odd job man of Vancouver, had given every cent he owned to the Greek war, \$52, saved in nickels and dimes to pay for his own funeral. George Pappageorge was impressed. He, too, thought of his homeland of his countrymen throwing back the onslaught of the Italian invasion. Taking \$100, from his savings he boarded the train for Vancouver and turned over the money to the officials.
