

Forced To Bend Before Abbie Onslaught

ABBIES COME BACK TO TRIM MONCTON HAWKS

Island Aggregation Win Heart-Breaking Game From Nickin Clan 2 To 1 After Herculean Struggle. Schwab Scores Winning Goal On A Pass From Kane — Hudson Scored Equalizer In First Period On Lone Attack.

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 23—(By The Canadian Press)—Avenge a 1-0 defeat suffered at the hands of Moncton Hawks on Monday, Charlottetown Abbeys won a thrilling 2-1 victory over the Hawks in the second overtime period of play in the second overtime period decided the match. It was the first game to be played here in the schedule of the new Maritime Hockey League, and the second contest of the circuit to date.

Record Attendance

Filling all available space in the stadium, 4,500 fans saw play that bristled with action and a free-for-all fight in the second period resulting in three minute penalties for six players, three from each team. While they were off the remnants of each squad tried desperately to score, but the opposing goalies made sensational stops and kept the puck away from the nets until the penalized players returned.

Abbies Have Edge

On the play tonight the Island pack were the better team. Jimmy Gardner has taught his pupils well. They showed keen judgment all the way through and the front liners were clicking in combination play and forward passing, much better than Nicklin's collection, and deserved their win.

Kane Outstanding

Jackie Kane stood out prominently in the Abbie victory and turned in his best performance on Moncton ice. He skated like a demon all night, took his bumps with a grin and kept continually plugging, and it was fitting that the little winger figured in the winning marker.

Schwab and Lawlor Great

"Baldy" Schwab, also played a fine game tonight, while Walter Lawlor who replaced "Chuck" Jemmett as pivot man for Kane and Schwab, also showed up well and this trio along with "Daddy" Bubar were the stars for the red and black shirted club. Bert Connolly, long gaited all round man, Sammy McManus and Dud James were outstanding with Jimmy Foster for the Hawks.

A Thriller

Tonight's game was a thriller all the way, there were thrills, spills and plenty of hard checking and an old fashioned free-for-all fight thrown in for good measure. In the middle chucker following a mix-up between McManus and McArthur, players for both teams milled and when they were finally pulled apart, six men were given three minute rests and during the time they were in the box, "Daddy" Bubar and Jimmy Foster gave phenomenal performances between the uprights.

The Counts

Each team scored a marker in the initial twenty minutes, Bert Connolly poking in Dud James' pass for the first count and less than three minutes later Ron Hudson knotted the count when he raced down right wing, shot as he struck the Moncton defence and continued right through to pick up his own rebound and drive it into the hem. From then on play saw-sawed up and down the ice at terrific speed, but neither team were able to notch up another tally in the regulation time limit of sixty minutes.

Feeling Runs High

When the timers released the six penalized players, they all made a mad rush for the surface and as a result the six tumbled onto the ice at once in a heap. Feeling ran high all night. Sticks were carried high, and the odd sly poke and trip escaped the eyes of the referees, but no serious damage resulted. Ferguson went off for repairs in the third period when he attempted to check Connolly, but missed him and crashed into the boards while Sammy McManus sustained a cut over the left eye in the first period when he slipped and fell head first into the boards.

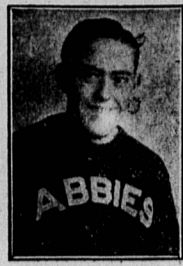

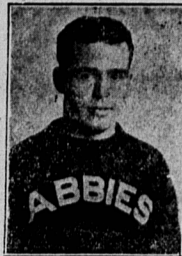

Play By Play Report Of The Abbie-Hawk Game

The following is a bulletin radio broadcast of CFCY in conjunction with the Charlottetown Guardian of the Abbie-Hawk hockey game played in Moncton last night:

The teams, Abbies: Bubar, goal; Oliver, Gross, Ferguson, defence; Jemmett, Beaton, centres; Schwab, MacArthur, left wings; Kane, Hudson, right wings. Hawks: Foster, goal; Gill, Burrage, defence; McDonald, James, centres; Irvine, McManus, left wings; Muckle, Connolly, Webster, right wing. Referees: Les Lowther and Jack Brown.

The Hawks were the first to work out and appeared in brand new white and black uniforms. Aubrey Webster, right winger, is making his first appearance with the home team, while Bill Miller is not being used tonight. Prior to the first appearance of the Island troupe, the Hawks went through a stiff workout much to the delight of a rink full of people. It is estimated 4,200 are present. The Abbies came on to the ice and were given a big hand by the crowd, just two or three minutes before the gong started play. Their workout consisted only of shooting and skating.

Les Lowther and Jack Brown are the referees. The appointment of Lowther was somewhat of a surprise as Earl Prowse had previously been named.

The Abbies crossed things up by starting young Walter Lawlor at midice flanked by Kane and Schwab while Nicklin started out with Connolly at centre and McManus and Webster on the wings.

From the faceoff the puck went back to the Abbie defence, Kane rushed up the wing but lost to McManus. Kane came right back for the first shot of the night on Foster.

The play was fast but Lawlor skated ahead of the first bit of combination play. Burrage stepped into Kane hard as he tried to crash through. Oliver carried the puck and was booted. Kane had another long shot at Foster. Gill knocked Lawlor down as he attempted to work through. The Abbies are forcing the play, but Gill and Burrage are checking hard. McManus was in for a nice shot. Cross carried down but took a long shot from outside. Lawlor picked up a loose puck and Foster saved again. The invaders are outplaying Moncton. The Abbies are throwing long shots and trying to work around the defence for rebounds.

Connolly worked in for a close shot and Burrage raced in for a hard rebound shot which Bubar saved. Dud James replaced Connolly at centre, while Nicklin pulled him at once for the Muckle, McDonald, Irvine line and Gardiner also switched to the Beaton, McArthur, Hudson trio. McDonald and Muckle worked a neat play which stopped at Bubar when he turned Muckle's shot aside. Beaton and McArthur combined for a clever play, but their shot was blocked by Gill. Ferguson replaced Oliver. Gill faced off in the Moncton defence zone. Muckle raced from end to end, but Bubar saved and also threw aside Irvine's rebound shot. Hudson had a peg, but Beaton was ahead of the play.

The play is exceptionally fast. Gill and Hudson engaged in a bodying duel and bumped Hudson right outside of the blue line with a terrific check. McDonald steps into Ferguson and the latter fell. McDonald and Irvine carried up but the play was stopped for an offside. Oliver replaced Gross. Irvine is giving a clever skating exhibition and fell as he crossed the Abbie blue line. That was a

great save. McArthur shot and Beaton raced in alone, but Foster dived out of the cage and made a spectacular save. McDonald and Irvine were in but stopped at the defence. Each team is changing lines, James going to centre on the Moncton line with McManus and Connolly on the wings. McManus rifled one at Bubar but he saved nicely. McArthur was penalized for a trip and the Abbies are ragging the puck. The Hawks are forcing the play with a one man advantage. McManus and James combined for a nice play and on the pass out Connolly hoisted a terrific peg at Bubar but he saved. The pace is fast.

Schwab was in close but shot wide of the net. Kane is skating fast and playing a sweet game. The Abbies have outshot the home team. James and McManus went through the defence, but Bubar pulled a sensational save on the shot from McManus. McManus fell and slid into the boards, cutting his face above the eye. Webster came on right wing and Connolly went to left. Both teams are using the forward pass. Connolly scored on an ankle high shot on a pass from James after they had caught the Abbie front liners in Moncton territory. Time 14.26.

That was a great play. The pair split the defence and Connolly pegged hard for the count. Both teams switched lines and Connolly was given a big hand as he skated off. Hudson stole a Hawk pass but before he had a chance to shoot fell. Irvine went up and shot but Bubar turned it aside. McDonald had a nice chance there, but Bubar saved. Gill made an end to end rush after Hudson returned the play but shot wide. Hudson picked up his own rebound and scored at 17.20. It was a neat play. Hudson shot from outside the defence and eluded Gill and Burrage picked up the wafer and scored as Foster came out to save.

James was in for a high shot. James and Connolly broke up an Abbie play at midice and combined but Bubar again pulled a spectacular save on Connolly's backhand shot. The coaches are changing lines every three minutes now. The period ended with the count dead-locked.

The pace in the first twenty minutes was exceptionally fast, with the Hawks showing a slight edge in the dying minutes of play, after the invaders had forced the play for the first fifteen minutes. The Hawks were the first out for the period again.

James skated in from the face off but Gross blocked the shot and Schwab returned the play but shot wide. McManus took a long shot and Gross cleared the rebound as James raced in. Connolly shot from near midice and the peg was fifteen inches wide of the net. Bubar saved James long shot easily. McManus is playing a splendid game on the Hawks left boards. Schwab and Lawlor raced down but Lawlor lost the pass. Connolly shot out a nice pass from the corner but Kane nabbed it and started up the ice, but lost to McManus who in turn lost the puck to the Abbie defence. Lawlor was chased for tripping Connolly. McDonald, Muckle and Irvine replaced the Hawk line but Gardiner did not switch. Irvine was through the defence but shot wide. The Abbies are resorting to long shots with a man off. The crowd are booing Lowther's decision of a forward pass.

McDonald and Muckle busted the

back line open, but lost the heel. Gill raced from end to end and Irvine just missed the rebound. Schwab took a shot from midice and the crowd boomed. Kane is playing a sensational game on right wing, skating fast and backchecking nicely. Connolly, McManus and Webster replaced the Moncton line while Hudson, Beaton and McArthur came on for Charlottetown. Foster saved from McArthur. Webster was through but lost the puck.

Ferguson replaced Oliver. Both teams playing more cautiously. James went to centre and Connolly to right wing, Webster went off. Ferguson held James but the refs missed the play. Foster saved nicely from McArthur. There is a fight. Plenty of blows struck and the entire team into it. McManus and McArthur started and then four or five others went into it.

Gill, Burrage, McManus, McArthur and Beaton were given the penalties. There is a lot of wrangling and it looks as though Lowther missed the instigators of the fight. Gill and Burrage did not seem to be into the mixup at all. The argument is still going on and Referee Brown is now taking a hand while Coach Nicklin also rushed across the ice.

Play is resumed with Moncton using three men, Foster, Connolly and McDonald, while the Abbies have Bubar, Oliver and Kane. Gross was given a penalty there too. Bubar saved sensationally twice from Connolly in the three man game. Duke shot but Bubar saved again. Foster saved from Oliver. Seems odd just three men a side. "Connolly shot but Bubar saved again. Both goalies good. Kane missed an open net. Crowd near wild as two men of each side race up the ice. Schwab and Gross came on. Irvine and Muckle for Moncton. There is another argument over Kane skating off without a whistle for relief. The original four returned. Connolly, McDonald, Oliver and Kane. Lowther seems lost as to just the right procedure.

Kane in but Foster saved sensationally. The penalized players returned and in their scramble all fell on to the ice. The crowd is near wild yelling and hooting. Both teams back to full strength. It is a hectic hockey game. Thrills, spills and everything else. High sticks are being carried by all the players and everyone seems to be on pins and needles. Gross was stopped in midice and James just missed the net.

James is skating like a fool. Hudson was stopped hard by Gill as he tried to barge through. Play fast again. Bubar saved from James. Hudson was penalized for dumping Gill into the boards. Both teams change lines. Moncton has a one man advantage. Oliver fell and the crowd got a laugh. Schwab took a long shot from his own blue line and the crowd boomed. Bubar saved from McManus. Burrage stopped Schwab's long shot and raced up but Bubar saved and also

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 23—The naming of a complete and final list of referees for the league games and how they are to be appointed and by whom, was the highlight of the first meeting of the Maritime Senior Hockey League held here this afternoon.

The league executive, by a two-thirds vote, turned down the suggestion advanced by the Moncton representatives that the teams in the league use three forward lines instead of two. The suggestion was turned down cold by J. H. Conn and Steve Vair representing Halifax, and Col. D. A. McKinnon and H. S. Henderson of Charlottetown. Messrs. Vair and Conn said Halifax was not prepared to use three forward lines as they did not have sufficient players, while Charlotte-
