FOR SUMMERSIDE

The Formal Adoption Took place Yesterday Afternoon.

A NUMBER OF PROMINENT CITIZENS PRESENT

Mr. R. C. McLeod Presides and Delivers a Practical Address—Resolutions Passed Including one to Sir Wm. C. McDonald for His Gift—Excellent Addresses Given.

THE formal adoption of a branch of the McDonald Sloyd Manual Training System in our public schools took place in the Western School Building yesterday afternoon and was attended by a good representation of citizens who showed interest in this new method of training the young. Mr. R. C. McLeod, chairman of the School Board in opening the proceedings referred in touching terms to the death of our beloved Sovereign. Referring to the object the meeting he said the education of the children is one in which we are all interested. The school is instituted here as in other parts of the Dominion through the generosity of Sir Wm. C. McDonald who he was pleased to know was an Islander. The following resolution was moved by John M. Clark: Whereas by the great generosity of Sir Wm. C. McDonald who, at great expense has introduced into the provinces of our Dominion a system of Manual Training a branch of which is now about to be opened in Summerside and which system having been found to be very beneficial in the older countries of the world will undoubtedly result in great and lasting benefit to us as a community and as a province therefore Resolved that the sincere and cordial thanks of the Board of School Trustees of Summerside and also of the citizens be and are hereby tendered to our generous benefactor, Sir Wm. C. McDonald, for the great boon conferred upon us in the establishing of this

important branch of education in our town. The resolution was seconded by Mr. W. A. Brennan. Rev. Neil McLaughlin in supporting the resolution spoke of Manual Training which would tend to throw a respectable air around the manual labor, which he believed was bringing other countries to the front. We need labor to go hand in hand with capital to make a country. Mr. D. Rogers referred to the great advantages of education the boys of to-day have as compared with the days of his youth. He believed this would give the boys a good insight into the mechanical line of life and give them a liking for that which would better fit them for going through life. He thought that Mr. McDonald was doing the country a great amount of good and we should be thankful to him. Mr. R. Hunt thought it was a valuable acquisition to our school system and children would find the benefit of it in after years. Mayor Campbell, H. C. Mills, C. W. Strong, Dr. McNeil and John Clark also supported the resolution which was put to the meeting and carried unanimously. Prof. J. D. Collier, who is here to instruct the scholars, then gave a practical illustration of the work to be carried on in the school. On motion a vote of thanks was also tendered Prof. J. W. Robertson who was instrumental in introducing this system into our Province. A hearty vote of thanks was also tendered Mr. Collier for his valuable instructions.
