Island Missionary

Mrs. James Collins, President of the Mission Band at Glen William has received the following interesting letter which speaks for itself:—

Chentu, West China, Jan. 27. . . .

Dear boys and girls of the Glen William Mission Band: It is a long, long distance to be halfway round the world—just think of it—10,000 miles away. When you are having day over there we are having night here, so while I am writing this you are sound asleep in the dark and when you will be reading this I will be asleep in the dark. Did you ever read in the Bible of cities that had walls around them. Well, that is the kind of city I live in. There is a great wall around the city about as thick as the length of the Glen school playground, and we walk on top of it when coming home from school. The Chinese children play on top of the wall. There are four gates through the wall, and these are locked every night at dark so nobody can come in or go out. Two soldiers stand on guard at these gates all day.

Before the Chinese Revolution, when China had an emperor the Chinese wore pigtails, but since they became a republic and have a president they don't wear the pigtails any more. But some of the country here some of the

older men don't like to part with their pigtails, but a man with a pigtail can't enter the city. If the soldiers on guard at the gate see a man coming in with a pigtail he cuts it off, and sometimes you can see a lot of pigtails hanging by the city gate.

Every missionary has to take a Chinese name because the Chinese never could learn our long funny names. My name is Don, and the word for Miss is Jowza, so I am called Don Jowza, not Jowza Don as we would say.

It seems to us as though they do everything backwards here. They begin to read a book at the back and from the bottom of a page to the top. They have the sweet things in a meal first instead of last. If the Chinese are at an American party of any kind and they pass cake and crackers, they take all they can wrap up in their handkerchiefs and take it home.

There are an awful lot of beggars in China, and some of them are pitiful sights, with hardly any clothes, and sometimes their bodies are covered with running sores. Some of them can't walk, and they crawl along the street. Then there are very many blind people here, and very often we see two blind people going along the street together, trying to help each other along.

The Chinese homes don't have any fires even in the cold weather but where the people can afford it they each have a little basket with some hot coals in it. It is too funny to see children in the street

carrying these baskets under their coats, or sitting with their feet on top of it.

The little children from two to six years old live together in groups and shout "how-ba-how" at us as we go by. That is their way of saying how do you do, and they are very pleased when we notice them and tell them we are well. I wish you could see the horses they have here, never any bigger than a two-year-old colt at home. Just little ponies. One of our men tried to tell a Chinese about the size of our horses at a party, and the Chinese simply could not imagine a horse that would weigh 1500 lbs. They use water buffalo to do the farm work. There are very few cows and sheep here but

many, many goats and pigs. The farmers drive their pigs to the city markets in groves of fifty and sixty, and about all their pigs are black.

When I go home I will have to teach you all to eat with chop sticks. It is lots of fun when you know how.

I wish I could go to one of your meetings now, especially one like we had last summer with so many good things to eat.

I hope you will all attend the meetings regularly and do all you can to make them a success.
