SOLDIER READ OUT OF RANKS IN DISGRACE FOR INSUBORDINATION

NIAGARA.—ON THE LAKE, Ont., June 16.—Discharged in ignominy and sentenced to three months hard labor in the Lincoln County Jail, Private D. J. Kane, of the 36th Battalion, was publicly read out of his regiment at noon today. Kane, who enlisted at West Toronto, was convicted of insubordination and threatening an officer.

This is the first instance of the kind in years. The culprit was paraded in front of the battalion by a picket. The charge sheets, conviction and sentence were read, and the battalion was told that Kane was ignominiously dismissed. Kane was marched away, to be delivered to the jail authorities.

ASTOUNDING REVELATIONS OF LIBERAL MALADMINISTRATION SHOCKED CANADIANS

The Laurier Regime Proven to Have Been a Reign of Brozen Lawlessness Wherein a Liberal Cabinet Minister, Liberal Members of Parliament and Liberal Departmental Officials Were The Chief Offenders.

"In closing Mr Hughes pointed out the great danger confronting a country where rank corruption in political life prevails. This internal decay is even a greater menace than hostility from without. He appealed to all to do their duty, when the elections come on, for the country of the Borden-Rogers aggregation and make them give way to honest men."

Such is the hypocritical peroration of Mr J. J. Hughes at a meeting at Murray River reported in yesterday's Patriot.

The hypocrisy is only equalled by the audacity with the record of the Laurier Government is recalled.

Never in Canadian history have Parliament and the Canadian people been confronted with a record of political villainy and administrative corruption approaching that disclosed in the Ferguson reports.

The Lid Thrown Off.

What happened? They were met with an absolute reversal of the system followed by the Laurier Government during its long period of office. The Borden Government threw off the lid and insisted upon an inquiry which should be wide open, which should shield nobody. Whether and when ever an investigation was asked, it was granted immediately, and when the Liberals stopped investigating, the Government went on.

The net results, as disclosed in the House committees, were:—

(a) That the "boot scandal" collapsed utterly.

(b) That the financial loss through irregularities in the conduct of men selling to the Government amounted to one-eighth of one per cent, on the war expenditure of fifty million dollars.

(c) That two Conservative members were shown to have associated themselves with departmental transactions.

The Light Kept Out.

For years the Conservative party in Opposition strove to let in the light on the maladministration of the Department of the Interior under Laurier and his western lieutenant, "Honest Frank" Oliver. Case after case was brought to the attention of Parliament during the last half-dozen years of Liberal rule, and in every instance the Conservative demand for investigation was met by a stubborn refusal on the part of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Evidence upon evidence was submitted by Conservative members, pointing to the gravest malpractices in connection with the administration of the public domain, charges which involved general members then occupying places in Parliament, charges which involved the alienation of enormous land areas, timber rights, town sites, grazing and irrigation concessions, and in every instance Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers to a man voted against investigation, against the lifting of the lid, against the public right to know what was being done with the public resources.

Eleven Reports Tabled.

In June, 1913, the Borden Government appointed Mr T. R. Ferguson, K.C., of Winnipeg, a distinguished lawyer, a special commissioner to investigate the public domain under Laurier. Mr Ferguson conducted this investigation with great thoroughness and care, studying departmental records and examining a very large number of witnesses under oath. The work occupied nearly two years and resulted in the tabling of eleven reports, of which the following are the headings:—

- 1—Re Robert Cruise, Dauphin lands and Forest Ranger W. A. Davis.
- 2—Re Blood Indian Reserve and Frank Pedley.
- 3—Re Indian lands, James A. Smart, Frank Pedley and William J. White.
- 4—Re Timber berths 1100 and 1163, John S. McEwen, Oliver P. Carter, Sir Daniel McMillan and J. G. Turriff.
- 5—Re Grazing Ranch No. 2422, J. G. Turriff, A. J. Adamson and J. D. McGregor.
- 6—Re Craven Dam, Walter Scott, Lieutenant-Governor Brown and J. G. Turriff.
- 7—Re Timber berth 1107 and 1108, W. H. Nolan, A. W. Fraser and J. G. Turriff.
- 8—Timber berths 550½ and 528, Howard Douglas, R. E. A. Leach, D. J. McDonald and others.
- 9—Re Aylwin Irrigation tract, E. A. Roberts and J. D. McGregor.
- 10—Re Southern Alberta Land Co., Ltd., the Grand Forks Cattle Co., J. D. McGregor, Arthur Hitchcock and others.
- 11—Re the Cananaskis Coal Co., Ltd., Howard Douglas, Geo. E. Hunter, Walter Garrett and others.

He showed that in one case Oliver had collected royalties for years on coal mining on his homestead, when the mineral rights belonged to the Crown.

That he had violated the departmental regulations in restoring the rights of a land-purchaser in his own province after those rights had been cancelled, the lands subsequently passing into the possession of his son-in-law and then to himself after proving to be of enormously increased value.

Charges All Proved.

These reports, based upon official records and the sworn evidence of the men concerned, proved to the hilt the charges of wrong-doing brought against the Laurier Government, proved that the great natural resource of the West had been exploited and plundered for the benefit of Liberal officials and Liberal camp followers. They proved that this illegal exploitation had been conducted systematically and on so vast a scale as to stifle or pervert public opinion in the western provinces for the political benefit of the Laurier Government.

In every branch of the Interior administration, this broad trail of corruption and fraud was revealed. The taint attached to the disposition of Dominion lands, timber, minerals,

mining rights and privileges, water rights, Indian lands, to right which covered the surface of the lands, the trees that grew upon them, the minerals under them and the waters that flowed through them.

The Liberals went to Parliament proclaiming their intention of uncovering army contract scandals. They declared that money was being squandered in army expenditures. Their newspapers took up the cry and their campaign echoed from one end of the country to the other. They did not wait for the facts. Liberals in Parliament did not wait for the facts. They made their charges recklessly and trusted to luck to prove them. They did their best to ruin Canadian industry, Canadian workmen and Canadian credit.

restitution, and imprisonment. And as an earnest of his sincerity he publicly branded with his disapproval the conduct of those two Conservatives who had failed to live up to the standard which he set.

Laurier Was Dumb.

Sir Robert Borden in this declaration wrought courageously and well for clean conduct in the public life of Canada. He set a high example. A greater man than Sir Wilfrid Laurier might have risen to that standard, might there and then have joined in this great endeavour of political uplift. He failed. He had no word of condemnation, disapproval or even criticism of the conduct of his western lieutenant. In that moment of critical trial, with the eyes of all Canada upon him, the Liberal leader failed and was found wanting.

His Many Excuses.

It was not till Parliament had progressed that Oliver essayed a defence. He then issued a statement, in which he asked the world to believe that he thought he owned the mineral rights on his homestead, although these rights were reserved to the crown in his application, in the patent which he received, and in a memorandum from an official of his Department bringing the matter directly to his notice. He asked the world to believe that he, as the administrator of the Department on the one hand, and as a practical homesteader on the other, did not know what had been the invariable rule in all such transactions for years.

And in the second case, in which a great tract of valuable land had come into his personal possession after being wrested from the original holder, he asked the world to believe that no pressure had been exercised by himself or his Department. The fact that the man who took over the lands and transferred them to him was his own son-in-law, was, he said, nobody's business.

There it stands now, the blackest chapter of all the black chapters written into the administrative history of Canada by the Laurier Government and the bandits whom it fattened and employed.

SAVAGE TETEGPAPH

Drums, Talking Flags and Signals
Smoke of the Savage as Useful as
Wireless in Present Struggle

Despite secret codes, the absolutely public nature of the wireless for use in communication across the vast distances from England and France on the west and Russia on the east has rendered it well nigh as impracticable as the original aborigine's visible or aural telegraphy.

Lack of direct, secret communication seriously affected the co-operation between the distant wings of the Allies' fighting machine, until with the customary British aggressiveness a direct submarine cable has been laid—and in eleven brief days—from Peterhead, Scotland, to the White Sea on the Arctic shore of Russia. With both ends in strong control of the Allies, it is now possible to communicate in a minute with the Russian forces a thousand miles away and carry on concerted attacks on all sides of Germany, thus preventing her shifting troops back and forth as alternating attacks present on either side. This is a part of the "Spring drive" planned by the Allies, and it destroys Germany's greatest trump card in the game of war.

When England and her allies in the Eastern arena are ready for that smashing, grinding, battering blow upon the German front, Russia will receive "flash" it is now possible to open the German rear, and then Germany will begin to realize her utter helplessness to cope with her indomitable foe, for allied with aeroplane scouts reporting the shifting of her troops and the two Allied fronts acting in concert, her lines must inevitably break. That will be the beginning of the end. When word comes that Germany is caught fast in the Allies' ring of steel the Union Jack should break to the breeze from every home in Canada. Liberal Astounded.

If the Opposition had been crushed before, they were paralysed and petrified by this last astounding disclosure. Here was a man who had traded for years on his reputation for rugged honesty, who had been called "Honest Frank," the champion of the square deal, preaching "the land for the settler." This man now sat convicted of having betrayed his trust for personal gain.

The next day came the last and greatest scene in this memorable series. Sir Robert Borden, as chief of the Conservative party and head of the Government, rose in his place, declared that neither he nor his party would tolerate graft in any degree, promised that frauds on the people would be followed by swift action,

WHAT SANK THE "LUSITANIA"

(Special to the Guardian.)
When charged with the sinking of the "Lusitania," Germany did not finally deny that it was done by a submarine. In fact, she gloried in the fact. German clubs and associations every where celebrated the event—even openly—until the populace compelled them to act a little more as though they had the consciences of human beings.

But, although Germany admitted the act, even officially, many arguments were put forth in vain attempts to justify the awful slaughter of non-combatants. The most common was the warning they had published, advising against sailing on that boat. There they seem to be that it is perfectly justifiable to kill a man provided you tell him you are going to do so.

Later they took the stand that the slaughter was to a great extent accidental. They held that only one torpedo was fired and that they knew that one torpedo would not be sufficient to cause such a sudden sinking as to seriously endanger the lives of all on board. They stated that it was their intention to so critically injure the great ship that she would certainly sink only after a sufficient interval to allow those on board to escape by the boats. In confirmation of this, they claimed that there was a second terrific explosion after the torpedo had done its work. They claimed that the second explosion was the blowing up of a large quantity of ammunition which they say that ship carried and that it was this second explosion which caused so sudden a sinking.

A very brief consideration of well known instances of the blowing up of magazines completely disproves this lame excuse, as has been the case with all of their other contentions.

In the cases of the Russian ship Petropavlovsk, the Japanese ship Hatsue, the French ship Liberte, and the United States ship Maine, the explosion of the magazine caused an almost immediate sinking barely two or three minutes elapsed between the explosion and complete disappearance. In the cases of the ships Maine and Liberte, it was possible to examine the wreckage. In both cases it was found that the entire deck above the magazine had been blown off bodily, lifted up and folded back upon the remaining deck, just as one would turn the leaf of a book. There is no reason to believe that there would be any different action in the case of the "Lusitania." Yet, there is absolutely no evidence of such action and no evidence whatever of any explosion of the magazine.

The truth is that the enormous charge of the present German torpedo was ample to cause very rapid sinking of the "Lusitania" by the combining action of the explosive itself and the terrific expansive action of the gases liberated within the hull as a result of the explosion. No one knew those facts better than admiral Von Tirpitz and his subordinate in charge of the submarine which lay in wait for the "Lusitania."
