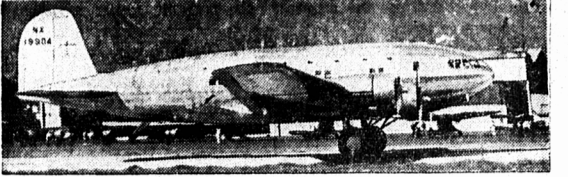
Unidentified Planes Fly Over Swiss

Greatest Aerial Fight In History Enters 4th Day

Stubborn Defences Of Britain Hold Firm With 69 Enemy Planes Shot Down.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—(Wednesday)—(CP)—The greatest air battle in history being fought in the skies of Britain—apparently the first stage of the German blitzkrieg against England—entered its fourth successive day today with undiminished intensity as Nazi raiders swept the length and breadth of this island fortress and subjected the industrial midlands to the severest bombing of the war.

Air Defences Hold Firm

Through it all the air defences of this hard-fighting and stubborn island held firm and exacted Tuesday a toll of 69 Nazi planes. Britain lost 11 planes.

Berlin Has Air Alarm

Berlin had a 47-minute air raid alarm this morning, and the big wireless station at Bremen shut down abruptly a possible sign of R.A.F. planes in the vicinity.

Girl's Assault Breaks Neck

10 Australian Leaders Die In Flaming Crash

Eiford, Mr. Fairbairn's secretary, Col. Thornthwaite, Brig. Street's secretary and four members of the plane's crew, were burned to death when the machine crashed near the Canberra airport.

The Minister predicted the Germans would increase their mass attacks to include these ports.
