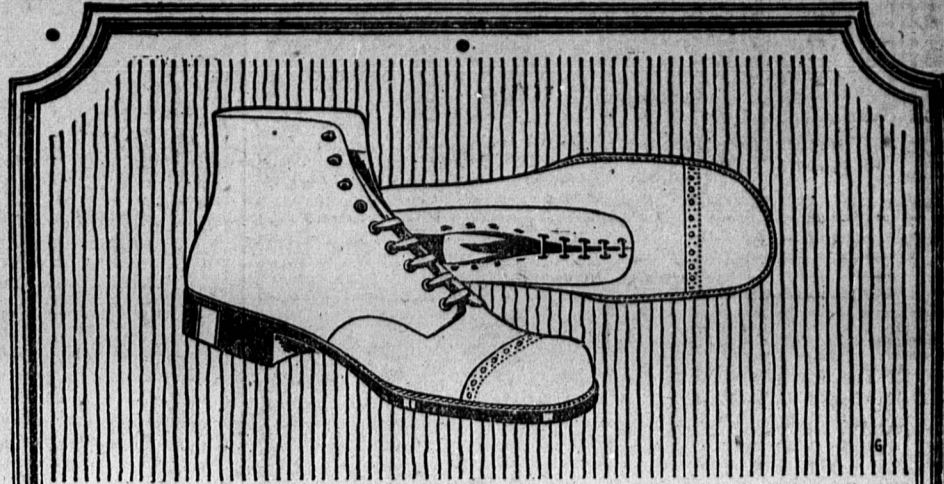

The anniversary was quietly celebrated owing to the prevailing epidemic of la grippe. The four daughters were all present, viz: Maude, at home; Mrs. Wilson and family, of Windsor; Mrs. (Dr.) Geo. H. Turner and two daughters, of Fort Saskatchewan; Mrs. A. W. Hyndman and two children of Charlottetown. P. E. I. In the evening a large number of friends called to congratulate the bride and groom of fifty years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Yould are among Kentville's best known and most highly esteemed residents. Mr. Yould spent forty eight years in railway work, commencing his career in 1863 at Halifax in the mechanical department of the Nova Scotia Railway. On January 1, 1897, he was promoted to be mechanical superintendent of the whole line of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway, and in August of the same year to engineer and mechanical superintendent. He served in the Kentville Town Council four years, from 1890 to 1894. He was appointed by the Government in 1894 to a seat on the Kentville School Board, which he held until elected by acclamation to be Mayor of Kentville in February, 1912, which position he held until expiration of his term, with high honor to himself and the town.
