**DISPLAY OF FANCY WORK**  
Pupils of St. Joseph's Convent Display Delicately Wrought Handicraft.

The display of fancy work at St. Joseph's Convent this year is of more than ordinary interest, both on account of its excellent quality, and the great variety of the pieces displayed.

In the section allotted to Grade III is shown a large assortment of dishes towels with designs of knif and fork, cup and saucer, etc. nicely worked in pleasing colors. Here are also shown samples of "darning", an art that is being taught as an early age to the little pupils and judging from the samples there are many adepts in this grade.

The Grade IV section has a magnificent showing of pillow cases with neatly embroidered monograms. A lovely display of guest towels is also shown here, some monogrammed and others having neatly worked floral designs.

A very pretty assortment of aprons of varied designs are shown by the Grade V pupils.

Neatly embroidered night dresses are exhibited in the Grade VI and VII sections and are indeed most creditable to the pupils of those Grades.

Perhaps the outstanding exhibit is that of Grade VII and VIII where is shown a number of "slips." Besides the neat stitching a feature of this exhibit is the trimmings of hand made lace.

Grade V and VI have a fine display of laundry bags and collar bags, with attractive designs worked.

A piece of work pointed out by the Sisters with pride was a crocheted lace yoke, the work of a pupil aged nine years.

Even the baby class was not overlooked; they have a section where a dainty display of little handkerchiefs is shown, the hemming being remarkable for the tots of this class.

The work of Grades IX and X comprises Altar linen exclusively. These linens used on the Altars and by the clergy while officiating, show great care in the work and extreme neatness in the designs.

There are many other articles shown such as cushions, centre pieces, runners, etc., all of which reflect great credit on pupils and teachers alike.

On all work is attached the name of the pupil, so that parents and visitors can tell at a glance by whom the article was worked.

**Ghost Again Wins Race**  
On Saturday afternoon on the Charlottetown Harbor the Ghost once again proved her sailing ability by defeating the other three boats of her class in a close race over the same course as the previous races, only that the course was sailed over the bay from the pier to the point to Park Buoy to Rosebank number three to East River, twice around and made a very interesting race from start to finish.

The four boats sailed almost as one from the start until they reached the same point on the last leg of the first round. When the Minnegoo and Ghost sailed out in front, while the above boats to the finish, while the same thing was happening for third and fourth place with the P-No and Zenith, the former winning the position and lucky prize offered by the club.

At the Park Buoy the Minnegoo crew extinguished the flames. It will probably be necessary to start construction at once, if the first proof warehouse is to be replaced in time for the autumn potato shipments. OTTAWA, June 23.—Canadian egg markets continued firm today. A price advance has been reported from Halifax.

TORONTO—This market remains steady, with dealers buying from country shippers at extras 34c; firsts 31-32c; seconds 24-26c.

MONTREAL—The local egg market is firm and active under a good consumption demand. Extras especially are in demand. Jobbing prices are extras 38c; firsts 35c; seconds 29c.

HALIFAX—The local egg market is firm with a good demand. Prices to country shippers have been advanced for extras 32c; firsts 27c; seconds 22c; delivered.

MONTREAL, Que., June 24.—The trade in cash grain in the Montreal market Saturday was of a very limited character owing to the fact that exporters received little response to the offers to foreign buyers overnight. The undertone to the market for car lots of oats was steady. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were well maintained under a moderate demand from all sources. A moderate amount of business was done.
