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A RECORD ATTENDANCE AT PROVINCIAL RIFLE MEET

Which Began at Kensington Range Yesterday Morning—Difficult Conditions for High Scoring, Tyros Shoot well—The Results of Yesterday's Matches

The Annual Prize meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association opened yesterday at Kensington Range under somewhat unfavorable weather conditions which were however more than equalled by the large attendance and the usual enthusiasm of the riflemen. The day opened fine and clear with first rate light, but with an unsteady left wind—the marksmen lane—a wind that varied from four to eight degrees. In the afternoon the riflemen were handicapped further by a puzzling haze which deepened until sunset and made high and steady scoring extremely difficult in the Hodgson match. The attendance was a record one, and broke all former records, almost one hundred and fifty men shooting in the matches. Of these about sixty-five are Tyros—men who have never won a prize greater than two dollars at a previous meeting. The showing of the new men was highly creditable and promising, one of the number winning the Lieut. Governor's match, and several others being well up in the prize list. The usual number of veteran shots is in attendance, and the usual enthusiasm prevails. The veteran range officer Lt. C. Dugherly is in command of the range, assisted by Capt. Goodwill, and the efficient and courteous Secretary Capt. Bartlett, is in charge of arrangements. Today the second stage of the Weeks match of 600 yards will be fired, and if possible the three stages of the Prowse match. PEACE CONFERENCE NOW MAKING SOME PROGRESS

Articles Four and six Disposed of—the Payment of Indemnity and Cession of Sakhalin Postponed—More Fighting is Reported—Military Procurator Finds Court Martial Not Severe Enough.

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 15—(Special)—Articles four and six in the Japanese conditions of peace were disposed of today. There are: Article Four, mutual pledges to observe the integrity of China and of the open door for the commerce of all nations. Article Six, covers the surrender of all Russian leases to the Liao Tung peninsula, Port Arthur, Dalney and the Blonde and Elliott Islands. Discussion of the cession of Sakhalin and of the indemnity is postponed. ODESSA, Aug. 15—(Special)—The Military Procurator has appealed against the sentence imposed by court martial on two boys, each twenty years old, and a girl thirteen years old, of penal servitude for being in possession of explosives, He urges capital punishment. TOKIO, Aug. 15—(Special)—Admiral Lataoka reports that a detachment of his squadron on August thirteenth bombarded Lazoaraba Point. Marines were landed and were fiercely attacked by the Russians in ambush but who were finally dispersed.
