Tourist Movement To National Parks Breaks Record

(United Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The national parks throughout the country are being visited by unprecedented numbers of sightseers, some of whom travel from coast to coast by automobile to get a glimpse of the natural scenic wonders of the great open spaces of the west.

Reports to the National Park Service of the Interior Department say there were 1,611 visitors to Yellowstone for the month ended June 15, a 125 percent increase for the same period last year when a record of 138,252 for the season was established.

A big increase in the automobile travel to Yosemite in California is shown, 8,550 of the 11,745 persons visiting the park during May traveling in 2,669 cars, an increase of 50 percent over May of last year, and a total increase of 20 percent, considering all means of travel. To June 7 the total had reached 23,109, more than half of whom went in 4,200 automobiles. The 1923 season mark was 130,046 for Yosemite.

The reports state that Crater Lake, Oregon, has experienced a banner preservation period, due principally to the attractions afforded campers of the west. On June 16 a total of 1,443 automobiles carrying 4,226 visitors from 32 states, including Maine, Vermont, New York, Washington D. C. and Texas, had toured the park. At this time last year, due to a later opening, not a single visitor had entered the park. The 1923 season mark was 52,017.

Travel to Mt. Ranier, Washington, increased 82 percent in May compared with that month last year, 6,075 of the tourists going in 1,525 automobiles compared with 3,246 cars in May, 1923. On June 15 the total was 183 percent over last year when the season mark was 123,708.

How Old Is Your Mind

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Aug. 10.—What is your educative capacity? Three years ago a series of psychological tests on school children was started by the Consultative Committee of the Board of Education. A report of these tests has just been published. It is mentioned in the introduction to the report that some members of the Committee exhibited themselves to experiments. How they fared, however, is not related.

In one test "the child was shown three words, the first pair indicating a definite logical relation, and was required to work a sort of 'rule of three' in words instead of numbers; for example: Black is to White as Bad is to ? Leg is to Body as Wheel is to ?

"Sometimes the logical relations had to be combined to form inferences, as in the so-called test of syllogisms and in many other tests of reasoning. The following are simple illustrations:— Tom is taller than Jim; Jack is taller than Tom; which is the taller of the three? John said: 'If the train is late, I shall miss my appointment; if the train is not late, I shall miss the train.' We do not know whether the train was late or not. Can we tell whether he kept his appointment?"

Among the "Absurdity Tests" are the following:— I have three brothers Jack, Tom and myself. What is silly and absurd in that? Once the body of a poor girl was found in a wood, cut into 18 pieces. They say that she killed herself. What is foolish in that?

FIND THE ABSURDITIES Under the heading of "A Sunday in France" the "child is required to read the passage and to discover as many absurdities as he can:— 'Two years ago, on a pleasant summer's afternoon in the middle of January 1916, the 12 o'clock express from Scotland was rushing past the busy terminus of the Great Western Railway at 12 miles an hour. "A clean-shaven young Englishman, of about 50 years of age, stepped lightly from one of the first-class carriages and hurried slowly down the platform, with both hands in his pockets, carrying a heavy bag and a gaily curling the tips of his moustache."
