GENERAL KUROPATKIN.

RUSSIANS RACE TOWARDS MUKDEN

Hotly Pursued by Jap Forces—The Terrible Losses—Retreat Along Three Roads Besides the Railway Covers Fifteen Miles—May Make a Fight at Mukden or Retreat to Harbin for Winter Quarters.

THE RACE FOR MUKDEN.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—(Special)—There is practically no fresh news from the scene of war but all advices show the Russians are making a precipitous retreat northward and that the Japanese are racing with them towards Mukden in the effort to cut them off.

SUPPLIES AND GUNS.

It is believed the Russians will get much of their supplies and guns away, but the Japanese may be in time to prevent their making an effective stand and thus compel them to flee north to Harbin.

REAR GUARD DEFEATED.

It is believed Kuropatkin's rear guard has been severely defeated but there are no details yet of the guns captured or of stores destroyed.

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LONG RETREATING COLUMNS.

The Russian retreating columns are over fifteen miles long.

BY THREE ROADS.

Kuropatkin has three roads over which he is marching towards Mukden, besides the double tracked railway. The latter is chiefly occupied with the transportation of guns and of equipment of which there is a large amount.

The soldiers are marching in light order and most of the wounded have already been dispatched north by rail.

RUSSIAN LOSSES.

The Russians estimate their losses in the fighting at Liao Yang at 15,000 men and say the Japanese losses are twice as great.

TO EVACUATE MUKDEN.

There are reports of preparations to evacuate Mukden, but there may first be heavy fighting there should Kuropatkin reach that place without further disaster.

WINTER QUARTERS.

If driven out of Mukden there is no place between that city and Harbin, 280 miles further north where the large Russian army can find winter quarters.

There are now four French warships here, the flagship Duplex and the cruisers Trousse, Lavoisier, and the Jurien de La Graviere.

The procession marched to the Labor Hall, Kent Street, where speeches were given by the returning ones. In conversation with L. B. McMillan the Guardian was told that had not Halpenny unfortunately lost his pole he would undoubtedly win first place. Every effort was made by telegraph and otherwise to create it but it was not found till returning at Detroit.

WANT A MINISTER OF LABOR.

LEEDS, Eng. Sept. 6.—(Special)—The Trades Union Congress demands the appointment of a Minister of Labor in the Cabinet.

STRIKERS APPLY FOR WORK.

CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—(Special)—With a prospect of the near settlement of the stock yards strikes over a thousand strikers have applied for work.

THE TERMS PROPOSED.

The proposition provides for the calling off the strike, skilled men to receive the former scale of wages, men to be re-employed as soon as possible and the office of steward to be abolished by the union.

AN ACCIDENT ON THE RAILWAY

When the eastern train was coming in to the station at six last evening the engine and one car jumped the tracks at the points of the switch about 50 yards from the station.

The engine No 22, in charge of Driver John McLean approached to the edge of the breast work where it lay at an angle of about 40 degrees to the main track. The breast line was considerably torn up, sleepers broken and rails twisted. The baggage car was placed on the rails without difficulty but it was nearly midnight before the engine and tender were restored to the rails. The work was conducted by a large number of railway men and watched by many spectators.

There was apparently no cause for the accident as the switch was in its usual condition.
