TURKEY SEEKS TO FORTIFY DARDANELLES French Permission and Co-operation In Fortifying Vulnerable and Strategic Point Requested.

By Richard G. Massock, Copyright, 1935. (By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, Dec. 23—Turkey was represented in informed Parisian quarters tonight to be seeking France's consent to the fortification of the strategic Dardanelles in preparation for a mutual assistance pact against any Italian attack.

Acting Prime Minister Lapointe, Minister of Justice, placed Canada on the front pages of the world during Mr. Mackenzie King's absence when he issued a statement denying Dominion responsibility for the suggestions at Geneva that oil, coal and steel be included in the commodities covered by League of Nations economic sanctions against Italy.

Mr. Mackenzie King returned from his holiday to find a vacancy created in the Senate by the death of Hon. Charles Murphy. It was quickly filled by the appointment of Frank P. O'Connor of Toronto.

Opportunities for the seating of Finance Minister Charles Dunning and Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture were found by appointment to positions of emolument of members-elect in Assiniboia, Sask., and Queens, P. E. I.

Robert MacKenzie, elected for Assiniboia, was made a member of the Canadian Farm Loan Board and J. Larabee, elected in Queens, was appointed to the department of fisheries. By-elections were fixed for Jan. 6.

Throughout this period the government has been negotiating with Japan for a settlement of a long standing trade dispute, laying plans for the appointment of a royal commission to investigate Canada's penitentiary system and preparing for the Parliamentary session which opens probably the last Thursday in January.

AT ROTARY—London is becoming quite a modern city, with the merchants pulling out their old store fronts and replacing them with large plate glass windows and flood lights, said Colonel C. L. MacKay in addressing the Rotary luncheon yesterday on his trip to the Old Land, when he attended a world-wide convention of the Churches of Christ in Leicester last summer. While commenting on the change in the stores in London, Colonel MacKay pointed out, however, that the Bank of England is also being remodelled. They have been at it for five years and expect to be finished in three years, but they are leaving intact the old pillars. The Colonel in the short time at his disposal touched briefly on many of the places of interest he visited in England, Scotland and France. In London he referred to St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, the Houses of Parliament, the Tower of London, Windsor Castle; in Scotland, Edinburgh with its great war memorial, Sir Walter Scott's castle, Glasgow and the Clyde where the world's largest steamer, the Queen Mary is now being built with 7,000 workmen engaged, Inverness and Loch Ness, the home of the famous monster.

VICTIMS' WIDOWS TO GET PENSIONS EDMONTON, Dec. 23—Pensions of \$36 a month for life for each of the women widowed in last week's mine disaster at Coalhurst, Alta., were announced today by the Workmen's Compensation Board. Should receive a settlement of \$480 at the time. For the 23 children orphaned in the disaster, \$12 monthly will be given the eldest in each family, \$10 to the second, \$9 to the third, and \$8 each to others. These pensions will be paid until each reaches the age of 18.

NRA MEETS OFFICIAL DEATH AT WASHINGTON

Presidential Order Terminates Existence of Recovery Act. (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Dec. 23—The NRA, paralyzed by court decision since last May, was killed today by President Roosevelt.

In a brief executive order, Mr. Roosevelt said: "The National Recovery Administration and the office of the administrator thereof are hereby terminated."

About 1,046 employees still on the active payroll for Jan. 1 are to go into the commerce department to complete code histories, industrial studies and file consolidation that have been the NRA's chores since the supreme court stripped it of code making and enforcement powers by the Schechter decision. This work is to be completed by April 1.

About 25 others in the consumer division will go to the Bureau of Labor Statistics to continue their studies of how the purchaser is affected by current business methods. George Berry will continue as coordinator for industrial cooperation, reporting to Mr. Roosevelt what labor and industry want to do to speed recovery. Berry has a staff of about 25.

Hepburn Faces Slander Charge

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Ont., Dec. 23—Claude C. Savage, acting as London agent for the Toronto law firm of Slaght and Cowan, today entered an appearance on behalf of Premier Hepburn in the London Supreme Court offices, in connection with the slander action brought against the Premier by Henry M. Walker, Arthur G. Slaght, K. C., is expected to defend Mr. Hepburn in the action.

Walker himself faces trial in an alleged extortion plot against the Premier. Walker asks unstated damages in the slander action.

Homer B. Neely will represent Walker, who is held in Elgin County jail awaiting at the winter assizes opening in London, Jan. 27. Mr. Hepburn, now in Florida, will be a witness at Walker's trial. It was believed unlikely the civil action will be entered for trial at the same court.

Veteran Civil Servant Dies

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Dec. 23—R. W. Brender, former commissioner of customs for Canada, who died in Florida today, was internationally known as an expert on tariffs and taxation. At the time of his retirement early this year he was one of Canada's veteran civil servants with 50 years service to his credit. He served the government for a number of years as commissioner of income tax and later became commissioner of customs.

Ill-health and advancing years compelled him to give up that post in Dec. 1933, but his great store of technical knowledge and experience led to his being retained as tariff advisor to the Minister of Finance until March 1935, when he retired. Mr. Brender's appointment dated from 1894 when he entered the postal services as a clerk.
