THREE DAYS ALIVE UNDER THE WRECKAGE.

OTTAWA, April 23—"There were in all eleven men injured. One of them is expected to die, as he refused to have his leg amputated, which, the doctors say, would most likely save his life." This is a portion of the official report of the Transcontinental Railway disaster at Coucoucacha, which was presented this morning to Gordon Grant, Chief Engineer, by A. E. Doucet, District Engineer in charge at LaTouche.

This laborer whose leg is so badly crushed that he cannot live without its being amputated, cannot be moved from his decision. Nothing that the doctors can do will persuade the man to allow the leg to come off. The other ten laborers caught in the accident were not seriously injured. Yesterday morning the two men reported missing were found buried under the debris from the wreck. One of them was dead, while in another there was a spark of life. The accident occurred about seven o'clock on Monday morning, and from that time up until nearly Thursday noon, this man had lived underneath all the wreckage of the cars and the ties of the railway track. It was thought at first that there was some hope of the man recovering but he died on the way to the hospital.

STRIKERS AND POLICE CLASH.

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 23—The first clash between the police and the strikers at the Pressed Steel car plant at Schoonville occurred last night. By a coincidence it occurred at the corner known as "Bloody Angle," where half a dozen men were shot down in the strike riots of last July. Four men were shot last night and one foreigner, who is unidentified, is in the hospital with injuries received when a train struck him while trying to escape. The injured are Policeman James McDaniel, shot in the hip; Joseph Virdol, shot in the thigh, and John Koeski, shot in the arm. Besides these one man was seen to be carried away by strikers and is believed to be secreted in one of the strikers' houses. Koeski escaped across the Ohio River to Woods Run, but was pursued by the police and arrested there and brought to the hospital.

The rioting was started by about a hundred of the strikers congregated at the "Bloody Angle," who refused to move on when ordered by McDaniels.

CLIMBED VOLCANO IN RECORD TIME.

KINGSTON, St. Vincent, April 23 Norman Lamont, the Scotch traveler and Alpine climber, and former member of the British Parliament, ascended the Soufriere volcano last Tuesday in one hour and fifty minutes, establishing what is said to be a record in point of time consumed. He also climbed the northern lip at an altitude of 3,700 feet, and accomplished a circuit of the crater. In ascending the volcano, Mr. Lamont had the advantage of excellent weather and was enabled to take observations and photographs, besides collecting many geological specimens. The climber found the crater quiet, with no steam escaping from the fissures.

RECORD FOR IMMIGRATION.

OTTAWA, April 23—The immigration into Canada in March last was the largest recorded for any one month by the immigration department. The number of new settlers entering the country during the month was 33,065 as compared with 16,464 for March of last year. Of the number 17,310 came from the United States, and 15,755 by ocean ports. During the fiscal year ending the 31st of March 208,794 immigrants arrived in Canada. Of the total 103,798 came in by ocean ports in the previous fiscal year 146,908 came to Canada, 59,832 from the United States and 87,076 by ocean ports.
