Mr. Keith Boswell, president of the Prince Edward Island Ayrshire Breeders' Club, presented the certificates to the Reid Bros., to Edwin Reid, Souris, for having bred these cows, and to Gavin Reid, Montague, the owner, for having raised, developed and made the records. Mr. Boswell stressed the fact of the great importance these men were to the breed and the live stock industry in being able to breed and develop such wonderful producing cows. The Reid Bros., in responding, gave a very interesting account of their start with Ayrshires and the foundation stock they secured has led up to their present attainments. Mr. Gavin D. Reid, as director for the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association in the Maritimes, presented Mr. Thos. Hooper, Pictou, N.S., with the certificate awarded to his daughter, Miss Mary P. Hooper, for having bred and owned "Onsow Lass". Mr. Hooper in replying gave an interesting account of this wonderful cow's achievements.

## Ayrshire Breeders

The Nova Scotia Ayrshire Breeders' club held their annual meeting in the conference chamber of the Maritime Winter Fair building with a good representative gathering of the members present from all over the province.

The President, the Rev. J. P. Mackay, Shubenacadie, occupied the chair. The secretary's report showed a good credit balance in favor of the club and very encouraging reports were given by a large number of the members.

This club has, for the past few years, been centering most of its activities in fostering community shows in all parts of the province with marked success.

The entire state of officers were re-elected for 1937: President—Rev. J. P. Mackay, Shubenacadie. Vice-President—C. F. Hatch, Alma. Secretary-Treasurer—W. R. Retson, Truro. Auditor—Dr. J. M. Trueman, Truro.

At the conclusion of the annual meeting a smoker was held at which the Nova Scotia breeders were joined by breeders from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to do honor to three of their fellow breeders who have recently been

Dam of Winswept Betty, also a Gold Seal Certificate holder. Her dam Briery Belle of Sunny Slope 2nd, is the only living Ayrshire, or of any other breed, with a daughter and a grand-daughter in the 100,000 pound class.

Production records:—104,414 lbs. milk, 4,241 lbs. fat, 4,04% in 9 lactations or 2,666 milking days. She won a Silver Cup for her 10 year old record which was the highest scoring record made that year on two milkings-a-day. Second highest Maritime Ayrshire producer. Only twelve other cows have won this honour by adding four bred or owned in the Maritimes.
