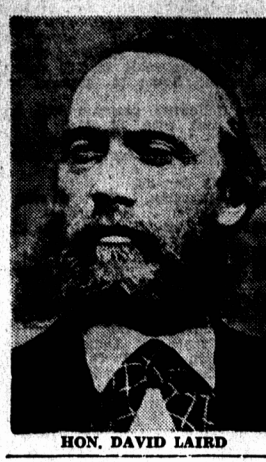

The Public Life Of The Hon. David Laird

PART II The First Island M.P.'s in Parliament

With the Island's entry into Confederation it became necessary that its members be elected to represent the province in the House of Commons.

When they went to Ottawa, these men found themselves the centre of much interest, for since they came from a new province, it was not known exactly what their political affiliations were.

Of the six Mr. Laird was expected to wield the most influence, for he was known to command the support of Sir John Macdonald, Yeo, and Davies, while Alexander Macdonald was associated with J. C. Pope.

Scandals Debate

During the autumn of 1873 the scandals debate raged in the House of Commons. Although it was expected that Macdonald would have to resign, he was not certain whether he would be forced to resign with his Government or have the privilege of choosing his successor.

He acknowledged that "it seemed a very difficult position for members from Prince Edward Island who never had a vote to give it upon a question of this description."

Alexander Mackenzie, the Liberal leader, was then called upon to form a government. In this new administration David Laird was the Minister of the Interior.

Through a minister of the Crown David Laird took little part in the proceedings of the House of Commons.

This situation prevailed for several years after the Island entered Confederation. Even in 1878, during a by-election in Queen's, Laird's own paper, "The Patriot" was able to say: "We Islanders owe no fealty to Macdonald, and we are not bound by strong party ties to Mackenzie."

It was not until the tariff and reciprocity controversies in the years which followed 1878 that Island politicians moulded their party sympathies permanently with those of the Federal leaders.

British Foreign Secretary Reviews Postwar Problems Facing European Countries

The following is a summary of the speech by Mr. Bevin, the Foreign Secretary, in the House of Commons on October 26th.

"Hunger and privation may bring further terrific human loss to Europe, more devastating than guns or even atomic bombs". This warning was given to the world by Mr. Ernest Bevin, the Foreign Secretary, speaking in the House of Commons on October 26th in the debate on conditions affecting displaced persons in Europe, with particular reference to the situation in Eastern Europe.

Mr. Bevin began by saying "I wish there were similar parliaments to this free, unfettered one, discussing this problem in other countries in Europe. There are two kinds of hunger in Europe today. One is physical hunger. But I sometimes think that the awful blackout over Europe is creating a great spiritual hunger more devastating even than physical hunger."

DEPORTATION OF GERMANS

About the deportation of Germans, he said that many of the deported Germans being driven back into Germany proper, had been taken by Hitler and put on the farms of the Poles and others he had displaced. This movement was not the beginning, but the development of what had already occurred.

The Foreign Secretary said that for months, in the Coalition Government, they studied objectively the kind of situation which they thought would face them at the end of war.

DISEASE AND EPIDEMICS

Mr. Bevin spoke of the efforts to build a wall of defence against disease and epidemics in Europe. But he added "resistance in your own country, with two ounces of fat a week, is pretty low".

Dealing with the transfer and migration problem in Eastern Europe, he said that present evidence was that some Germans were drifting back into the Polish zone. There were also millions of people in Germany and the Middle East—displaced persons as the result of slave labor—and he asked the House to appreciate the position as far as one could get it in terms of figures.

GERMANS IN RUSSIA

Another problem was Germans who had gone to work in Russia. He did not know the numbers—only the Russians knew that. As they got people over into the western zone, they were getting an overwhelming majority of women and children, but no men.

FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES

What was really needed was the acceptance of fundamental principles. We were going to try the economic approach for the redevelopment of the world with less concern of fear than hitherto.
