

Brooklyn Dodgers Win Close Duel With Boston Braves By 3-2 Score

Brooklyn Dodgers and Boston Braves hooked up in another tight National League game yesterday (Sunday) and the Braves came out on top, 3-2, with Joe Hatten besting Warren Spahn in a left-handed pitching duel.

Jackie Robinson provided the punch that brought Hatten his hard-earned victory, singling with the bases loaded and two out in the seventh to drive in the tying and winning runs.

The victory, scored before 24,349 fans, gave the Dodgers the series, 1-1.

Bob Muncief came in to retire Eddie Karak in the last of the ninth and stop a Cardinal rally giving Pittsburgh Pirates a 4-2 victory over St. Louis club.

Elmer Riddle had worked his way out of two previous Redbird threats before the Cardinals broke his shutout in the ninth.

The seventh-place Cardinals dropped to last place behind the Pirates as a result of the victory.

Frank Behrman pitched a seven-inning one-hit shutout for New York Giants whipped Philadelphia Phillies 3-0 in the nightcap of a twin bill curtailed by the Pennsylvania Sunday curfew law.

Bobby Thomson smashed a two-run homer in the 15th inning of the opener to give the Giants a 4-2 victory. The game was the longest of the year in the major leagues this season.

After losing the opener of a doubleheader 4-1 to Cincinnati Reds, Chicago Cubs captured the nightcap 10-2 by exploding for nine runs in the sixth inning to rout Herman Wehmeier.

DETROIT TIGERS SLAM OUT 14 HITS TO DEFEAT ST. LOUIS BROWNS 6-4

DETROIT, May 29 (AP)—Detroit Tigers slammed out 14 hits as they beat St. Louis Browns 6-4 yesterday (Sunday) to sweep their three-game series.

Hook Evers of the Tigers and Jerry Friday of the Browns each hit a two-run homer.

Right-hander Paul Calvert had his sinker ball working to perfection for seven innings while hurling Washington Series in to a 10-4 victory over Boston Red Sox, who were dropped into third place in the American League. The Senators belted out for six innings and the Charlottetown Abbies and Sunnyside Curran and Briggs battled it out for six innings to end up in a 4-4 deadlock.

The game was scheduled for nine innings but had to be called at the end of the sixth on account of rain. It was the second exhibition game between the two squads, with Summerside taking the first at the Western Capital a week ago by a score of 7-2.

Sam McCready Wins British Golf Title

PORTMARNOCK, Ireland May 29 (AP)—Sam McCready, a real fighting Irishman, won the British amateur golf championship Saturday on his first try.

He capped a morning round of 70 with a blazing stretch finish to beat the United States champion, Willie Turnesa, 2 and 1 in the 96-hole final.

Irish eyes were smiling as McCready, a 31-year-old Ulsterman, rolled in a three-foot putt and won the crown on the 35th green.

Then the 4,000 fans who had tailed doggedly for six hours over the desolate Portmarnock links swallowed up their hero in a stampede on the green.

They had sound cause for their enthusiasm. McCready's great victory ended a two-year American squeeze of the British title.

Turnesa, of Elmford, N. Y., won it in 1947. Frank Stranahan of Toledo, O., the Canadian amateur titleholder, took the big cup home last year.

Abbies, Curran And Briggs Tie 4-All In Exhibition Baseball Game

Playing their first game of the season on home ground, the Charlottetown Abbies earned a 4-4 tie with the Summerside Curran and Briggs nine in a return exhibition baseball game at Memorial Field yesterday afternoon before a large crowd of spectators. The game didn't cover the full route, however, but had to be called at the end of the sixth inning because of rain.

The game was a well-played, closely contested affair, with some nice fielding plays being pulled off by both teams with smart ball being featured throughout. Under the supervision of the Charlottetown Baseball Association, the appointment of two young ladies, Misses Claudette MacMillan and Maureen McCorkell, to carry out the collections from the spectators, was tried for the first time, and proved highly successful. The services of two young boys, Brian McCallum and Bobby Dillon, also provided by the Association to look after stray balls also added much to the success of the game.

Cyril Smith, starting on the mound for the Abbies, held the Summerside squad to a no-run, no-hit first inning with the Abbies taking the lead right from the second half of the first when Stanley crossed the plate from second base on a single to centre field by Charlie Ryan.

Held down pretty close by Summerside's starting pitcher Gerard Bernard for the next four innings, Ryan's locals were not in possession of the lead for long when the Curran and Briggs battery opened up on Smith in the opening of the third to score four runs before the side was retired. With the bases loaded and two men out, McKay, getting on by an error on MacKinnon at short, Schurman home, and Gaudet, singling to centre to send Landry and Grady home, to put the visitors out in front by three runs. The side was retired when G. Bernard was thrown out at first by Stanley on a ground ball to second.

Glen Matheson of Abbies belted out the only double of the game at the last of the fourth but was tagged out trying to make third, while the Abbies came through with the only double play of the game in the sixth as well when Whitlock snared Syl Bernard's grounder to short, threw to Stanley at second forcing out Powell coming from first, with Stanley losing it to Ryan to tag Bernard going to first.

Epic Wins Easy Victory In King's Plate Classic

TORONTO, May 29 (CP)—There's not much mystery about Epic any more. The shining, brown colt is probably the best Canadian-bred three-year-old in the Dominion.

The colt showed his class Saturday before an estimated 42,000 racing fans with an easy victory in Canada's turf classic, the 90th running of the \$100,000-added King's Plate over the nine-furlong route at Woodbine Park. It showed its heels to the highly-touted even-money favorite Speedy Irish with 2-1 odds to spare.

Filias, a rank outsider quoted at 80-to-1 odds on the tote board, hit the show slot another six lengths in the rear.

Epic, owned by Toronto millionaire E. P. Taylor and ridden by Chris Rogers, 24-year-old Toronto-born jockey who has found greener pastures in the United States, made it look easy. Rogers, almost meeting on the colt's shoulders at the finish line, wasn't worried at any time of the race.

Epic simply breezed in. And the breeze paid owner Taylor \$10,810 cash, 50 guineas from the King's purse by the Ontario Turf Club and the fame and glory attendant with this spectacle, the oldest continuously-run race on the North American continent.

Epic was conditioned in the U.S. during the winter and, with exception of a winning center over six furlongs in the Plate Trial a week ago, it had never raced before in its life.

Four Top Teams In Central League Finals

TRURO, N.S., May 29 (CP)—The top four teams of the six-team Central Baseball League will be eligible for play-offs this year, President Lee Carter of Springfield, N.S., said here today. Mr. Carter made the decision after a league executive meeting today gave him power to decide the issue.

The league gets underway Monday with Truro Nationals meeting Springfield Fenciblesters at Truro while Westville Minors play host to Stellarton Abbies. Kentville Wildcats and Amherst Ramblers open later this week.
