G.L.W.S. Head and Education Director Arrive In England

OTTAWA, Nov. 18: Lieut.-Col. D. E. Macintyre, D. S. O., M. C., general manager of the Canadian Legion War Services, and Dr. A. E. Chatwin, M. C., newly appointed overseas director of the Legion's education division have arrived safely in England according to a cable received here.

In the United Kingdom on an inspection of G. L. W. S. activities among the Canadian a med forces, Col. Macintyre will confer also with Legion and military authorities with a view to extending education, entertainment, recreation and other services during this coming winter season.

Col. Macintyre will join Dr. Chatwin in conferences at Canadian Military Headquarters, London, relative to Lieut.-General A. G. L. McNaughton's acceptance of the Legion's education services to the men of the C. A. S. F. The Commander of the Canadian Corps overseas, who sanctioned Dr. Chatwin's dispatch to England as director of education, has been deeply impressed by the increased demand for such services.

The efforts of the Legion, which are being rendered on a strictly non-profit making basis, are regarded as highly essential in helping to maintain the morale and fighting spirit of the men. They will be of even greater importance in offsetting boredom and monotony if the land forces in Great Britain go through a comparative inactivity winter.

Japan To Get Increased Oil In Dutch Indies

BATAVIA, Netherlands East Indies, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Japan's oil supplies from the Netherlands East Indies will rise from 494,000 tons a year to 1,800,000 tons under an agreement announced today, with United States and British companies acting as importing agents for the Japanese.

The agreement is expected to remove a possible source of trouble in view of urgent Japanese needs and the weakened position of the Dutch Empire since the fall of the Netherlands to Germany.

It was worked out between Netherlands colonial and oil company officials and the Japanese, chairman of the Japanese Mitsui interests and representative of Japanese oil companies.

The Standard Vacuum Oil Company and the Rising Sun Petroleum Company, Japan subsidiary of British Shell, will serve as importers for Japan and officials of both the Standard and Shell interests were consulted in the long negotiations.

(The United States and British governments, according to statements in the House of Commons, also watched the negotiations closely.)

The agreement was most welcome to Japan in that she long has been eager to lessen her dependence for oil upon United States and British sources.

Japan already was getting 494,000 tons of oil a year from the Netherlands East Indies. Now she gets an additional 1,306,000 tons—760,000 tons of it is crude and the remainder in other oil products.

ROTARY

"Saving Democracy From Within" was the subject of a timely and interesting address given by Rev. I. J. Levy, pastor of the Baptist Church, of this city, to the Rotarians at their luncheon yesterday.

With regard to our democracy as something of sacred and precious value and are willing to do anything in its defence and we are fighting the enemy without, knowing that we will win. Another letter was read from Stanley G. Forbes of Brantford, Ontario, chairman of the Magazine committee of Rotary International.

After the guests had assembled Mr. Emmett Glow read a letter addressed to read the following address, which was accompanied by a well-filled purse, presented on behalf of those present by Mr. John Deignan, to which, Everett, in his ever-cheerful manner replied, expressing his gratitude to one and all, for their act of kindness in thus bidding him farewell. "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" after which luncheon was served and the remainder of the evening spent in playing music being furnished for the occasion by the Mulligan Orchestra.

The following is the Address:—Everett Glow.

R. C. A. F.

Dear Everett,—When word was received that you were about to depart recently, that you are hearkening to the call of your Country, in the defence of our cherished Democracy, our feelings are this evening to bid you farewell as you bid your departure from our midst, naturally are feelings of pride for the patriotic spirit in which you are answering the call to do your country's most important military-machine constructions.

Although we are justly proud of you today, your departure to me in the temporary severing of the bonds of your companionship which it has been our privilege to enjoy, it will mean a long gap in the social life of the community, so, we, your friends and acquaintances of your Native village of Emerald, have met here this evening to bid you farewell with regret, that we are experiencing this evening, to assure you that we will follow your career with keen interest and that, when this terrible bloody conflict will be over, and this old world will once again be safe place to live in, being definitely ridden of the bullying of despots and dictators, and civilization restored to its proper place among oppressed peoples, you will return to our midst, when in the meantime we will be anxiously awaiting you.

Before you go, however, please accept, parting remembrance which a souvenir, that the words here addressed to you are sincerely genuine.
