WAR'S GRIM HARVEST

(Continued from page one) were received without excitement, but with the deepest gloom. The immediate effect of the war cloud is likely to be a compromise on home rule, since all parties feel that domestic discussions must be settled at all costs, in the face of peril from without.

The fierce demands of the Conservative papers for a general election have been wholly hushed. The foreign office has become the most important branch of the government and no one wants to risk the possibility of losing Sir Edward Grey, with his exceptional influence in the councils of Europe.

IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT MEETING THE CRISIS CALMLY

The government is confronting the situation with perfect calmness. There is no sign of unusual events at the foreign office, except that the prime minister, Mr. Asquith, who seldom visits that office, called there this evening, and conferred with Sir Arthur Nicolson, permanent under-secretary, and the Austrian ambassador came to make formal announcement of the declaration of war.

The ships of the British fleet everywhere are taking on supplies. Soon after it became definitely known that Austria and Serbia were at war, all the officers and sailors ashore at Portland and Plymouth were summoned back to their ships.

VIENNA, July 29.—News of the formal declaration of hostilities was received with a patriotic outburst throughout the capital.

A great crowd paraded before the various ministries singing the national air and cheering for the government. A mob surrounded the assassination of Archduke Ferdinand, and "Burn Belgrade and assassins' den."

It is with a feeling of intense relief that the people in the dual monarchy look forward to the war which has been declared.

Whether the war will be confined to the two countries cannot yet be said, but the feeling is optimistic in high official circles.

The news of the formal declaration of war ran through the city before the extra editions of the papers could reach the vendors' hands, and was everywhere greeted with a spirit which might be described as close to religious exaltation.

The greatest patriotic demonstration ever witnessed in the Austrian capital, occurred when great throngs marched through the streets of the capital shouting cries of "Down with Serbia" and "We want war with Russia."

The police were hard pressed at times to control the mobs, which threatened to attack subjects of Servia. A special guard was set over the Serbian legation, which one of the throngs was flaming by dispatches from Serbia, stating that Austrians were fleeing from Belgrade had been fired on by Serbian troops.

ANY RUSSIAN MOBILIZATION AGAINST AUSTRIA MEANS WAR

BERLIN, July 29.—No confirmation has been received either by the German foreign office or the Russian embassy of the mobilization of various army corps in Russia, reported in dispatches to London.

A German official declared flatly that any Russian mobilization against Austria, partial or otherwise, meant war. German mobilization orders would then, he said, immediately be issued, and when these had been launched there would be no possibility of recalling them, or of Germany resting on her arms while negotiations continued, as the strategic necessities of war on her two frontiers would force Germany to strike immediately and hard.

The opinion was expressed in well-informed Russian circles yesterday, however, that partial mobilization of Russian troops along the Austrian frontier was quite probable, as an answer to the Austrian declarations of war on Serbia.

Servian officials here appeared to think that such a step could be undertaken without evoking a German counter-mobilization.

again be bridged. The first important fighting occurred before Belgrade when Servians blew up the bridge across the River. The Austrians attacked them, and the Servians retired to the capital which an unformed report says is being bombarded.

SERBS WILL MAKE WAR GAME OF HIDE AND SEEK.

LONDON, July 29.—The correspondent of The Daily Chronicle at Belgrade, telegraphing Tuesday, says there have been no active hostilities between Austria and Serbia, beyond the exchange of shots between frontier and river patrols.

"The last of the foreign residents in Belgrade," the correspondent says "have just crossed to this side of the river on a steamer flying the Russian flag. Meanwhile, the Servian army gives no sign of life. No trace can be found of such an army. Searching parties have been unable to locate the elusive Serbs. It seems as if the campaign is to be carried on under revised war rules—a game of hide and seek in which, until now, the Servians are hiding, Belgrade itself is now at the mercy of the enemy."

IMMENSE CROWDS SEE FUNERAL IN DUBLIN

DUBLIN, July 30.—More than 200,000 persons, standing barheaded and silent in the streets, last night witnessed the funeral procession of the three persons killed last Sunday, when the King's Own Scottish Borderers fired into a mob during an attempt by the police and the soldiers to seize arms.

The procession, which started from the Cathedral, was a mile and a half long. The mayor and the city council and other public bodies and battalions of Nationalists followed the hearse. As the funeral cortege passed the scene of the shooting the bands played dirges.

Burial was in Glasnevin cemetery, and the volunteers fired a volley over the graves.

GOVT. TAKING OVER N.B. AND P.E.I. RAILROAD

HALIFAX, July 30.—A telegram was received in Halifax on Wednesday evening, containing particulars of an important railway deal which is to be put through by the federal government.

F. P. Gattuso, the general manager of the Canadian Government Railways, entered that day into an agreement with the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Railway, running from Sackville to Cape Tormentine, for the purchase of this line as a branch of the Intercolonial.

The agreement is subject to ratification by the Parliament of Canada. The newly acquired branch will at once be brought up to the standard of the main line. It will be able to take up the Island traffic from the R. C. just as soon as the terminals are under construction at Cape Tormentine, on the New Brunswick side, and Carleton Point on the Island, are completed. An up-to-date ferry will be put into commission at an early date, and a shorter and more convenient route to the Island will be opened.

FIRE DESTROYS CASINO.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—A Casino at Monterey, Mexico, valued at \$800,000, was destroyed by fire early yesterday according to dispatch received at the state department.
