SAYS AMERICANS WILL DISCRIMINATE ON PANAMA CANAL

PARIS, Feb. 20—The Panama canal was the subject of a lecture tonight by M. De Rousiers, professor of political economy, before the Franco-American committee, presided over by Admiral Fournier. After reviewing the history of the canal, Professor De Rousiers said that the United States would be the complete master of the situation. He pointed out that although the treaties guarantee equal treatment to all nations, the United States could discriminate in favor of American ships trading between two American ports.
