SPORTING COMMENT

In conversation with a number of travelling men last evening at the Victoria, the writer was informed that the Travelers' Field Day in Charlottetown this year was one of the finest outings ever staged by the Executive. Everybody enjoyed themselves to the utmost and the wish was expressed that Charlottetown would be named the site for next year's games. Quite a number will pardon me if readers will pardon me what might savor egotism, it may be said that Charlottetown just can't seem to do anything in a half-hearted way. Nothing is too good for visitors.

CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

A total entry list of 185 athletes represented the cream of both Eastern and Western, Canada at the Canadian Field and Track Championships held last Saturday at the Varsity Stadium, Toronto. A number of stars from across the border, including one Cyril Coaffee from Chicago and formerly a Winnipeg boy, he could not compete in the States at Olympic trials on account of being born in Canada. It was one of the greatest meets ever held in Canada. Not only in numbers set a new record but the quality of the entrants who came from both the Pacific and Atlantic coasts and the provinces in between. Fifteen of sixteen men who won Canadian Championships at Fort William last summer were on hand. The sprints, brought out large fields and both the 100 and 200 yards necessitated heats, semi-finals and finals to determine the champions while the quarter and half mile events were run in heats to determine the finalists.

FINE EXAMPLE

The interest manifest in wrestling and good clean boxing exhibitions, by His Honor Lieut. Governor Heertz and His Worship Mayor Miller being boosted in Charlottetown. The attendance of those distinguished gentlemen at the different lines of athletic endeavor is a glowing example to the rest of the citizens of Charlottetown, especially the younger generation who should be given the opportunity of witnessing exhibitions of clean physical combat, the great heights of physical and mental perfection to which the human body may attain is truly exemplified in the careful training coupled with clean living and good habits of the successful boxer, wrestler, field and track men and the many other endeavors in the mental and physical sports.

COAFFEE THE GREAT

Cyril Coaffee said before the meet he was in the very best of condition. "I am not the young fellow I used to be," he remarked. "I know I have to be right to win today, and if I am beaten it will be a case of youth having its way. However, I have had a long career and I can't kick. I do not want to make the Olympic team next year, however, if I do I will be the only Canadian who ever represented Canada in three Olympic meets. That is what I am shooting for now. They will have to be good to win today. Three Olympic meets means 12 years, as there is only one meet every four years. Coaffee make the grade. He won the second heat of the century to quality and win the final in 9.4-5 seconds, one fifth of a second slower than his world's record mark. To beat a man who has a second in a hundred yards dash would be leading him about ten feet at the tape. Not bad for Coaffee who is well up in years, and one time where youth failed to conquer a sturdy pair of legs working machine like under a perfect body.

GETTING INTO LIMELIGHT

For the first time in the history of boxing on the Island this city will be represented in the Maritime Amateur Boxing Championships the site of which has not as yet been named. However it is rumored that Charlottetown will make a strong bid for the splendid attraction this year. If such a thing happens the officials here are not successful in getting the meet, we may feel reassured in the fact that two or more Maritime boxing championships may come to the Island.

POINT GETTERS (?)

To look over some of the times and distances in the different events will lead one to think that these will never figure in a world's athletic meet. The pole vault was won at 11 feet 6 inches. Twenty men from other countries can do over 13 feet and two or three over 14 feet. The broad jump was won at 22 feet 9 inches. Hundreds can better that and dozens are jumping around 24 feet, the vicinity of 100 pounds. They carry no excess baggage and make every pound count when in action. 
