GREAT BATTLE NOW IN PROGRESS

At and About Liao Yang—The Japanese Make a General Attack—Nearly Half a Million Men Struggling for Victory on the Manchurian Plain—The End Not Yet in Sight.

BIG BATTLE ON.
LONDON, Aug. 30.—(Special)—A big battle is now on around Liao Yang and it is believed it will be a decisive contest, but may last several days yet.

THE JAPANESE ATTACK.
Early this morning the Japanese began the attack on Kuropatkin's forces pouring a heavy and well-directed shell fire into the Russian positions and killing many with shrapnel.

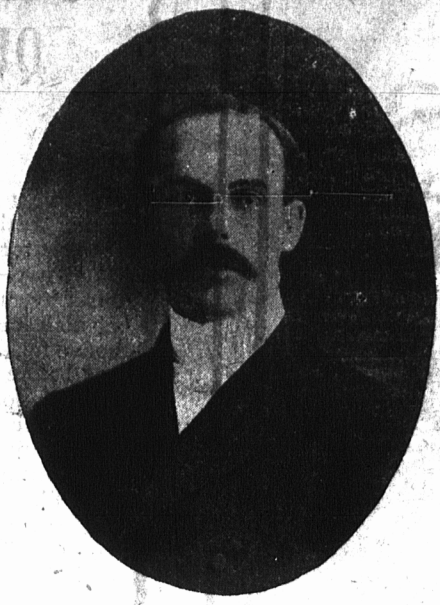
HALF MILLION ENGAGED.
The Japanese forces are believed to total two hundred thousand and nearly half a million men are engaged in the struggles.

THE EMPEROR'S BIRTHDAY.
The Japanese are believed to have attacked because this is the Emperor's birthday and it is thought they will also assault Port Arthur vigorously to-day.

PRESSING RUSSIANS HARD.
There is no news how the fight is going, but the Japanese are believed to be pressing the Russians hard at all points.

BIG GUNS PLACED.
Heavy artillery was placed in position last night to sweep the Russian positions and many wounded have been carried back to Liao Yang to-day.

[From the above despatch it would appear that one of the great battles of the war is on. The condition of the country is such owing to the recent heavy rains as to make military movements slow and difficult. An immense force is engaged on both sides. The fighting of several days past has gone in favor of the Japanese who have driven in the Russians on the east and south thus forcing them to concentrate in and around Liao Yang. We have been led by their past victories to look for continued Japanese success, but war has many chances. The possibilities of the near future may give a serious check to the Japanese arms, or perchance a drawn battle, or a Russian defeat and disaster. The world will await the issue of the great battle of Liao Yang as it has been awaiting the result of the Port Arthur siege for weeks past with intense interest.]

CH'TOWN FARMERS' MARKETS.

The first market in the new building yesterday was largely attended by sellers and buyers, and well supplied with all the vegetables etc of the season.

Butter (prints) per lb. was a little higher bringing from 22 to 24 cts. Eggs still remain about the same price from 15 to 16 cts per doz.

Apples of all varieties were plentiful and brought from 12 to 15 cts per peck. Blueberries are still on the market and sell from 4 to 6 cts per qt.

Hay, on the square, in scarce supply advanced in price bringing from 65 to 80 per cwt.

Oats, new, sold from 36 to 40 cts. per bus, while oats, old, brought 45 cts. The price of potatoes, wholesale, per bus is about 30 cts, and retail at 55 to 60 cts.
