### WILL DISREGARD CANADIAN LAWS

CLEVELAND, O., July 23—"There will absolutely be no quarter given in the fight between the Canadian trainmen and the Grand Trunk and Central Vermont Railways," said President W. G. Lee, of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, on his return to this city today.

"The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors will back the strikers to their last penny.

"The strikers will hold out for the same terms granted by the Baltimore & Ohio, and which every other railroad excepting the Grand Trunk and the Vermont has accepted.

"At present the strike is being directed by Vice-President Murdoch, of the Brotherhood in Canada. However, I am expecting a call any minute and will leave for the scene whenever it comes, and notwithstanding the railroads are owned and operated by British capital and Canadian laws do not permit anyone from the States to direct a strike in the Dominion, I will take a hand.

"AMERICAN" BECOMES QUITE SENTIMENTAL OVER CANADA.

NEW YORK, July 23—The American today says: "Nearly half a million American investments there now amount to about a quarter of a billion dollars.

"This efflux of men and money is largely accounted for by the fact that the high tariff wall has induced American manufacturers for the Canadian market to move their establishments over into Canadian territory.

"In spite of the tariff Canada still buys in this country about three-quarters of a million dollars worth of goods every day.

"If the legal obstacles were abolished the daily purchases might be twice that sum.

"For a period of many years Canada sent the elite of its youth to make homes in the United States. We have gained two or three millions of our most substantial population from this source.

"This commingling of the two peoples has woven an intricate tissue of human reciprocities between the two countries, and it should have led not only to tariff reciprocity, but to political fusion.

"But those who still hope and strive for an all-British empire of the English-speaking people on this continent have now to face the fact that the tariff is rapidly tending to segregate the economic interests of the two countries.

"For the last thirty years and more, ever since Sir John Macdonald swept the Dominion at the polls with his high tariff apostolate—the Custom House has been the towering citadel of discord to keep the two great governments of America apart.

KILLED AT PRESQUE ISLE. PRESQUE ISLE, Maine, July 23—One man was killed and a man and a boy terribly injured when a hay wagon was struck by a Canadian Pacific Railway train at the Blake street crossing here today. Stephen Cahill, aged 34, was almost instantly killed. He leaves his wife and one daughter, William Carrier, aged 23, sustained serious internal injuries and was badly lacerated about the face and head. Percy Martin Twedy, the driver, 34, son of Henry Twedy, had both legs broken. Carrier has a chance to live, but young Twedy is in a critical condition.

SUES CONDUCTOR AND C. P. R. FOR \$10,000

OTTAWA, July 23—Ovid J. J. J. has issued a writ for \$10,000 damages against the C. P. R. and Stephen J. Metonigle, a conductor, for damages through the loss of his foot on May 24, while on his way from Ottawa to Carleton Place. He says he was assaulted by the conductor and locked in a car; that he was afraid he was to be assaulted again and jumped out of the train and had his foot so injured that it had to be amputated. The conductor contends he refused to pay his fare, and was placed in custody.

LADY GREY WILL GO WEST.

OTTAWA, July 23.—While Earl Grey is in the Canadian Hinterland, whither he goes in ten days, Lady Grey will camp somewhere in the rocky mountains, probably near Banff. This party will have escorts of mounted police.
