HOLD OPENING MEETING — The opening meeting for the fall and winter seasons of Trinity Church Women's Association was held Thursday afternoon in the East Parlor of Hearty Hall. The President, Mrs. J. The terms of the order-in-council making the appointments are announced in the Dominion. The president of the National Research Council will also be an ex-officio member in his capacity as president of the honorary advisory council for scientific and industrial research.

Labor Board Opposed To Formula

Canadian Press Staff Writer (Toronto, Sept. 27) — The National War Labor Board, in a far-reaching decision, tonight declared itself opposed to a formula of pattern for the adjustment of wage rates which would not be subject to variation in different cases.

In a decision granting wage increases totaling 15 cents an hour to some 50,000 workers in British Columbia shipbuilding industry, the Board explained its action and expressed belief "under conditions" would result from decisions which were based "on nothing but expediency and a dogged adherence to a set formula."

The decision itself dealt with a joint application of five B.C. ship building and repairing companies and 19 unions for authority to increase wage rates by 15 cents an hour and for certain adjustments in rules governing pay for overtime workers.

The application was based on a company-union agreement which provided that the standard work week would be reduced from 44 to 40 hours, with wage rates being adjusted to maintain "take-home" pay. This latter adjustment was included in the 15-cent increase.

The Board granted the reduction in hours and a nine-cent increase in wage rates, but refused the take-home rate on the grounds the reduction would not disturb normal production and that the increase would put more money in the hands of the workers and thus become inflationary.

Dealing with the remainder of the requested increase of 15 cents an hour—the Board granted the adjustment on the grounds wages in the industry had not been in other and kindred industries had advanced in the meantime. This year's wages were granted on Aug. 1 of this year.

The Board made it clear its decision was based on the interpretation of the term "just and reasonable."

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—Douglas C. Is Optimistic

Mr. Boulter recalled that last year there were requests for a floor price on potatoes "and inside 90 days we were in the black market. Can such a thing happen this year? I do not think so, but I think it is sufficient to place them in the market in such a manner as to have been done in New Brunswick."

There is no question but that with transportation as it is, a great many will suffer because they have not proper storage for their potatoes. It is not possible to have them in sufficient volume. But I feel satisfied from the reports we have received that Canada does not have enough potatoes to take care of her own requirements. If that is the opinion of those at Ottawa I question whether they would consider establishing a floor price. There may be some alternative that would be better than a floor price.

Mr. Boulter added "that is a matter for this meeting to decide. I will go into the question of your minds that the establishment of a floor price would be the end of your trouble. It might be only the beginning."

"We are handicapped by transportation," Mr. Boulter added "and we are in a position to get their only plus of potatoes on the 1st of May. It is not until the 1st of May that it could happen again. They will ask us at Ottawa, to begin with, to take care of her own requirements. I would say that at least 7,000 cars of market potatoes would be required to meet the demand for last year."

He believed that notwithstanding the tremendous crop in the Province the Government would require a lot of P. E. I. seed. New Brunswick would have a big output in 1947, but the Government would not think we need worry that our price will be so very low after the end of November."

Mr. Myers said he was greatly impressed by Mr. Peppin's figures. With this huge volume going on the market we can all see that there must be trouble ahead in other countries, and that will not take place over night. The Government has to take care of its own people's pockets. There was much further discussion of the suggestion of a floor price of May 1 as a date for establishing a floor price. Mr. Clark maintained that the Government would be inclined to grant this request, as Central Canadian potatoes would then be off the market and the Island potatoes coming on. There would be less risk in guaranteeing a price, and it would also help growers at that time. This view was supported by Col. Full, but opposed by Mr. Wright and other speakers. Mr. Wright offering his resolution as an amendment to the first one.

Neither resolution was put to a vote, but on motion of Mr. J. J. Trainor, both were tabled for 1939.
