### Loan Total Reaches 97.85 P. C. Of Objective

**Urges Special Drive on Individual Subscriptions in Rural Areas.**

The Victory Loan total in this Province swelled to \$3,131,200 yesterday, 97.85 per cent of the minimum objective of \$3,200,000. Officials at loan headquarters here urged a special drive today to reach the objective for individuals in rural areas in all three counties. They said that rural Prince received \$140,800, rural Queen's, \$83,850 and King's, \$85,250.

Both Charlottetown and Summerside have gone over the top, both on totals and on individual subscriptions. The totals by districts were: Summerside Individuals, \$380,000; Special Names, \$270,500; Prince County Outside Individuals, \$609,200; Special Names, \$63,000; Charlottetown Individuals, \$833,600; Special Names, \$300,000; Queen's County Outside Individuals, \$436,550; Special Names, \$54,500; King's County Individuals, \$239,750; Special Names, \$44,000. Total Individuals, \$2,469,200. Total Special Names, \$632,000.

### Coroner's Jury Gives Verdict In Child's Death

A coroner's jury, inquiring last night into the circumstances surrounding the death Tuesday afternoon of a five-year-old boy, Charles Stewart, brought in the following verdict: "We find the said Charles Stewart came to his death in the City of Charlottetown in Queen's County, on Tuesday, May 8, 1945, by being run over by a motor truck, causing a fractured skull. No blame is attached to Mr. Lord, driver of the truck."

### U-Boats May Surrender At Canadian Ports

OTTAWA, May 9 (CP)—Naval officials here said today there was a possibility German U-boats might surrender soon at east coast Canadian ports. A naval spokesman said: "In view of the fact that German submarines are known to have been operating off the east coast of Canada, naval officials believe there is a possibility that some of them will return to east coast Canadian ports to surrender."

TORONTO, May 9 (CP)—M. J. Goldwell, national leader of the C.P.F., will open his federal election campaign with a speech in Victoria May 21. It was made known today. ### Navy Denies Blame In Halifax Spree

HALIFAX, May 9 (CP)—Halifax stood on guard tonight against recurrence of yesterday's rioting which caused property loss now unofficially estimated at more than \$5,000,000, and two reported deaths.

Service police patrols were strengthened by hundreds of new men, civilian police kept guard with revolvers in holsters. And 1,000 picked troops were brought to the City and stood by to quell any further disorders like those of Monday night, and yesterday afternoon and evening when liquor stores and breweries were raided, and the entire business section of the city was wrecked and looted.

The situation seemed quiet tonight, and the curfew was reimposed at 8 p.m. by Mayor Alan Butler, who said the "danger is not yet past." All civilians and servicemen were ordered off the streets to their homes and barracks.

Confined To Barracks  
Several thousand naval personnel who led the rioting and looting have been confined to their barracks at H.M.C.S. Pergerine and the Dockyard. There were reports there had been attempted breaks, but these were not confirmed by naval officials.

Army and air force personnel also were confined to barracks and only those with military or curfew passes were allowed on the streets. Dartmouth across the harbor.
