Francis was an exceptionally bright lad for his years and was a great favorite with all. NET WEIGHTS FOR CANNED LOBSTERS.—Notices are being sent from the office of the inspector of fisheries, Charlottetown, advising canners of lobsters that the net weights authorized last season will be continued this season 1920, namely, after processing: quarter lb. cans, 3 ozs., half lb. cans, 6 ozs., three-quarter lb. cans, 9 ozs., one lb. cans, 12 ozs. To make sure that the cans will weigh out the weights mentioned above it will be necessary to weigh in the cans from the packing tables the following weights of dry lobster meat: Quarter lb. cans three and a half ozs., half lb. cans 7 ozs., three-quarter lb. cans ten and a half ozs., one lb. cans fourteen ozs. Meat must be packed and weights adjusted before putting the pickle in the cans. The above regulation it is emphasized must be obeyed, otherwise the canning licence of an offender may be cancelled on the first visit of the overseer, who is authorized to test the net weights of canned lobsters.

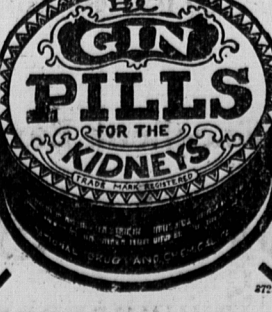

Reasons for Naval Changes

OTTAWA, March 26.—Today's House proceedings were completely dwarfed by interest in the Government's decision to scrap the Canadian navy. While no official explanation of the action taken has yet been offered, it is known that the order does not represent merely a departmental decision, but is the considered policy of the entire cabinet. In the absence of an official announcement, the view in parliamentary and newspaper circles is that the order is based upon three considerations: 1. That the existing naval organization is useless for purposes of defence, and that, consequently, all money for its upkeep (the amount is about \$600,000 annually) is absolute waste; 2. That at this time, when the country is facing a financial stringency, challenging the most rigid economy, expenditure of money for any futile purpose is indefensible; and 3. That the action taken, merely riding the country of a lot of junk, does not prejudice, hinder or delay any future naval policy that may be decided upon in the light of subsequent events.

These considerations beyond question weigh very heavily with the overwhelming majority in Parliament. The Maritime members (including British Columbia, as well as New Brunswick and Nova Scotia), of course, are not inclined to be jubilant over any proposal with the slightest suspicion of being anti navy, as they are confirmed believers in strong Canadian naval defence, but they realize that it is useless to breast the strong tide of economy and retrenchment which is sweeping through Parliament at the present time.

Also, there is this consideration: That, rightly or wrongly, the suspicion prevails that the personnel of the existing naval organization, with some few notable exceptions, did not represent a high level of capacity, and that any policy that will rid the country of such service is not to be lightly condemned.

Postal Revenue Shows a Decrease

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, March 25.—The Unionist Caucus today Senator Blondin, Postmaster General, explained that owing to the increased salaries paid to employees the surplus this year will not be very substantial. There was some discussion on this but the only suggestion involved by some members was that more should be charged for newspaper postage. It was claimed that the cost for this service was six million dollars more than the receipts.

Supreme Council To Meet in Italy

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, March 25.—The supreme council of the allies will meet at San Remo, Italy, on April 21, according to authoritative advices from Rome. The next meeting of the council of the league of nations will be held in Rome on April 25 or 26, it is announced.

New Brunswick Will Have Large Surplus

FREDERICTON, March 25.—Hon. Robert Murray, Provincial Secretary Treasurer, in delivering the budget speech in the New Brunswick legislature this afternoon, predicted a revenue of almost half a million dollars more in 1920 than the actual receipts of last year. The estimated receipts for the year he placed at \$2,829,482.14 with expenditure estimated at \$2,497,712.64 which would give a surplus at the close of the fiscal year of \$331,771.52.

MASSACHUSETTS CITY WITHOUT HOTEL

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., March 24.—With the closing today of its only hotel, the Parker House, New Bedford is left with no accommodation for strangers outside of the rooming houses. The old hotel, which has done duty for nearly a century and during its career has numbered among its guests Gen. Grant, the King of the Sandwich Islands, and many other notable, is to be torn down to make room for a theatre and office building. A new hotel is projected, but in the meantime the city is left entirely without hotel accommodations. The situation is rendered more perplexing by the fact that several large conventions are booked for the city during the next few months. As a possible solution of the problem the city authorities have under consideration a plan to purchase or lease a large steamship, to be moored at a city pier and used as a hotel until a new hostelry is completed.

Annual Meeting of Tryon Dairying Co.

The annual meeting of the Tryon Dairying Company was held on March 26. Last year the company offered prizes to the amount of \$75.00 for calves and poultry shown by the school children in the district at the Tryon School Fair. A great interest was taken in this by the children, and some fine stock was exhibited. The company have voted a similar amount this year for the work. We are looking to the parents to assist their children and help make this a banner exhibit.

The Protestant Orphanage

Following is a copy of the report of the Superintendent of the Mount Herbert Orphanage delivered at the recent convention of the Grand Lodge, L. O. A. in this city:

Manager's Report of Mt. Herbert Orphanage.

To the R. W. Grand Master, Officers and Members of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island.

Gentlemen:—Again as Superintendent of the Orphanage I have pleasure in submitting a short account of the working of the Home during the past year.

The year has been uneventful; we have had a very mild return visit of the influenza but apart from that the children have enjoyed good health. We have admitted 31 children since the date of last report, 21 have been taken out by parents or guardians, and one baby died. We have now 34 under our charge. This number has been fairly constant during the year, and together with the staff, has necessitated the issuing of 13,860 days ration (or 41,580 meals) in that period. This divided into the total expenditure, as shown by the books, gives a cash maintenance cost of slightly over 33 cents per day. And of this the farms pay 25 per cent in actual cash. As will be noted further on, this low cost average is only possible, because the farm also produces a great quantity of produce used on the spot. The total expenditure as shown by the books, is slightly below that of last year. Some of the most important purchases were meat, \$207.67, groceries \$387.97, and flour \$557.39. The large amount of this last account is due to the fact that we bought in view of a rise, and have still \$200.00 worth on hand.

The farm has done exceptionally well this year owing to the high price of all products.

We have sold produce to the amount of \$1072.07 and bartered \$414.3. The produce not yet consumed is worth \$1355.00 and we have consumed in the Home \$347.60 worth of milk, eggs, meat, flour and potatoes, produced on the spot. This gives a total from production of \$3316.30.

Our specialty is, of course, milk production, and the scales reveal that we produced 48,410 lbs. being 2,200 more than last year, although we have fewer cows. We have several high grade calves coming along nicely.

The garden, although attractive to visitors, was, owing to the exceedingly low summer temperature and constant rain, not so successful as in former years. However, we count that it produced \$100.00 worth of vegetables.

The school continues to do good work; there are at present 24 in attendance. For some months there were 28 but this was slightly beyond its capacity. Our correspondence has increased greatly, 176 letters and cards of acknowledgment were issued while 387 accounts were passed through our books.
