CENTRAL GUARDIAN Issue Joint Statement On Waterway Treaty

OTTAWA, July 22.—(By The Canadian Press)—Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and Premier George S. Henry of Ontario today issued the following joint statement on the Dominion-Ontario St. Lawrence agreement.

"The negotiations between the Dominion of Canada and the United States of America for the completion of the St. Lawrence waterway have resulted in the signing of a treaty which requires ratification by the United States Senate and by the Parliament of Canada.

Negotiations between the Government of Canada and Ontario have resulted in the signing of an agreement relating to the construction of and payment for the necessary navigation and power works in the International rapids section of the St. Lawrence River.

"Long and careful consideration has been given to the respective rights and interests of the Dominion and Ontario, and the many difficult questions involved and it is believed that the agreement is fair and equitable in all respects.
