SHERBROOKE SCHOOLS' MAGNIFICENT SHOWING.—The pupils of Sherbrooke School have set a mark for other, or indeed graded schools of the Province to aim at. Encouraged by their teacher they began on Thursday, October 22nd, the purchase of War Savings Stamps, as their contribution towards the war effort. By Friday, October 30th they had bought 343 stamps.
