RESULTS OF ALCOHOL AS SHOWN IN THE BIBLE

Hearts were saddened, lives blighted and cut short and kingdoms shaken in the days of the Old Testament by beverage alcohol. In 800 B. C. alcohol struck at the heart of the Northern Kingdom when Elah, the fourth king of Israel, was assassinated during a drunken carousal in Tirzah, the capital, after a reign of less than two years (800-786 B. C.). As Elah was drinking himself drunk in the house of Arza, steward of his house in Tirzah, his servant Zimri, captain of half his chariots conspired against him and went in and killed him. I Kings 16:9-10. No doubt it was Elah's incapacity and dissoluteness that tempted Zimri to aspire to the throne which he succeeded in obtaining by killing the king and the rest of the royal household. "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Proverbs 20:1.

Dear Co-Workers Across Canada: In her book, "Women Torch-bearers," Elizabeth Gordon wrote: "On December 14th, 1873, at Fredonia, N. Y., Dr. Dio Lewis made his inspired suggestion that the woman should enter upon a crusade against the drink foe of their homes. On that eventful day, December 15, cultured women, 208 in number, with prayer and song, marched two by two into the saloons and hotel barrooms of Fredonia, N. Y. What is more, they organized the following Monday under the name 'Women's Christian Temperance Union'." Mrs. Beale, in her book "Give Prohibition Its Chance," wrote: "The Crusade spirit swept across Ohio and through the Middle West like a prairie fire of the pioneer days. Catch the vision, grasp the torch come to our National Convention in September, equipped with the Crusade spirit and your Bible.
