go to school unless properly clad. The children absenting themselves from school were sure to get into trouble.

Attorney General F. A. Large said in the meantime His Lordship said the cause of juvenile delinquency was, in his opinion, due to adult delinquency. The respect of the parents to rear the children in a suitable atmosphere had much to do with the children going astray.

Mr. Brawlers' Report "You are no doubt aware of the aims and objects of the Society, namely the care and protection of neglected and dependent children."

"Children of this class are those whose parents fail to give them the start in life to which normal children are entitled.

"The work of the Society is serious work, and very important, and sometimes means taking children from their homes and placing them elsewhere to receive the chance in life of which they are being deprived by careless and imprudent parents, as well as those guilty of drunkenness and other misconduct.

"Since the outbreak of the war, new problems have presented themselves, and in many homes where the father of the family is absent on military duty the children are being poorly looked after and provided for by the mothers in spite of the large cheques which

"Many boys and girls who have been under the care of the Society have grown up to be splendid young men and women, and it would be interesting to know what their circumstances would be at the present time if it had not been for the assistance and care exercised over them by the Children's Aid Society.

"Another type of neglected child is the juvenile delinquent, who, in most cases, because of improper or lax home discipline becomes a source of annoyance and resorts to petty thieving, destruction of property, etc., for which he must be brought before the Juvenile Court. The total number dealt with in this court in the past year was fifty-seven, which is fourteen less than last year.

"There seemed to be an impression abroad this year that we had a very great increase in juvenile delinquency and there may be

DEATH YESTERDAY Charlottetown in 1915. Upon the amalgamation of the Department of Excise and Customs in 1923, he was promoted Assistant Inspector and shortly afterwards was made Inspector of Customs and Excise.
