B. C., Yukon Alaska road Cost estimated

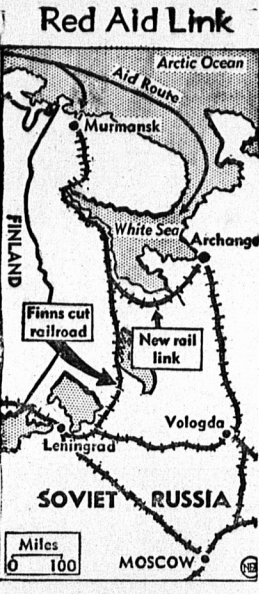

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—A strike called for midnight Friday which would affect the American telephone and telegraph communication system in 42 states and in Washington, D. C., was postponed tonight for at least a week.
CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (AP)—Spokesmen for 900,000 railroad workers in the non-operating osteogry announced today that they could not tolerate the terms proposed by President Roosevelt's emergency board for settlement of their wage dispute.
OTTAWA, Nov. 13 (CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King said in a statement tonight the action of the United States Congress to permit arming of American merchant vessels and to allow them to enter belligerent ports "is the most important contribution in the winning of the war which has been made by the United States" since enactment of the lend-lease legislation.
MILLTOWN, N. B., Nov. 13 (CP)—After two weeks of idleness the St. Croix mill of Canadian Cottons Ltd., remained shut today while upwards of 600 employees continued to stay away from their jobs.
BERNE, Nov. 13 (AP)—The Swiss telegraph agency reported tonight that Belgium's 350,000 rebel Serbs had been killed in clashes with regular, Axis-directed troops in the last few days.

The identity of the freighter was not disclosed. Officials said the cargo may have to be removed before attempts are made to refloat it.

Reserve man Acquitted on Murder charge

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 13 (CP)—A Supreme Court petit jury today acquitted George MacPherson, 24, of nearby Reserve Force, of murdering Patrick MacPherson, 18-year-old Reserve youth. The jury ended the two-day trial after only half an hour's deliberation and Mr. Justice J. S. Smiley ordered MacPherson's immediate discharge from custody.

LUNenburg, N. S., Nov. 13 (CP)—Fred Fox of Lunenburg received word today that his son, Sgt. Fred Fox Jr., of the Royal Canadian Air Force, is missing. The message gave no details. Only last Saturday his family received a cable from him sent from Malta.

Ships Free To Sail Anywhere; May Be Armed

Approval given by narrow margin in dramatic circumstances; British public pleased.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (CP)—The end of an era was reached late today in tense and dramatic circumstances when the House of Representatives joined with the Senate in repealing all but inconsequential sections of the United States Neutrality Act.

By the margin of 18 votes and after the administration had swung every influence it could bring to bear, the House passed the repeal resolution 212 to 194 and sent it to the White House for the signature of President Roosevelt.
