**P. E. I. AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL
EXHIBITION OPENS THIS AFTERNOON**

The Display in Products of the Farm and in Live Stock Probably the Best that has Ever been
Seen on the Island

THE FORMAL OPENING WILL TAKE PLACE AT THREE O'CLOCK TO-DAY

His Honor Lieutenant Governor McIntyre will Declare the Exhibition Open—Numerous other Prominent Gentlemen will Assist—The Fourth Regiment Band will be in Attendance—Officers of the Association Program for to-day.

What promises to be the greatest of Island exhibitions will be formally opened at three o'clock this afternoon though in the forenoon from ten o'clock the gates will be open to the public.

The indications point to a very large attendance during the week. Last night a large number came to the city by the Princess and the express, and the hotel report that for the next three or four days they will have as large a trade as ever in their history.

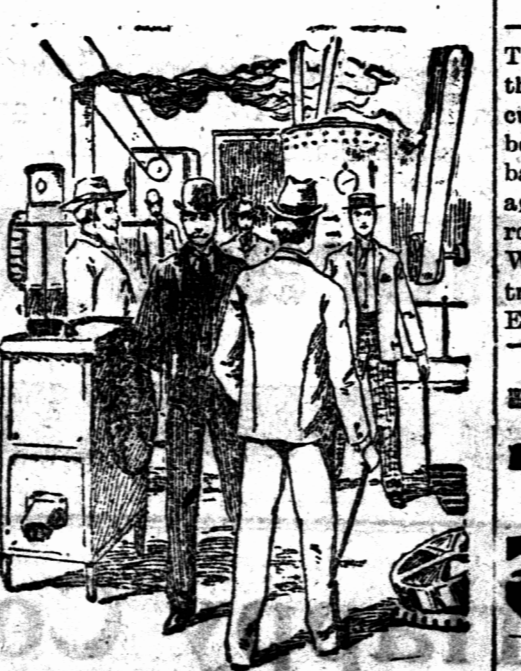
The Exhibition itself promises to be in excess of the most sanguine expectations and will doubtless be the best in the history of our provincial fairs. The special attractions will be novel and unique and will alone be well worth coming to the city to see. The horse racing will be very keenly contested and horsemen predict close and exciting finishes in the different classes.



In the main Exhibition building last evening things were fast assuming a presentable appearance when The Guardian representative dropped in. The exhibits of fruit, agricultural products, industrial arts etc mainly occupy the same positions



as in previous years. The owners of the various exhibits were putting on the last decorative touches before placing on the booths the articles for exhibition. The building itself has been artistically decorated with spruce, flags and bunting under the supervision of J. R. Davis. The work is both artistic and handsome. The space of the main building is fully taken up and some of the exhibits such as the manual training department will prove of great interest.



Outside the live stock is coming in rapidly though the exhibits will not be complete till noon to-day. The show of horses will be made more than ordinarily interesting by those from Nova Scotia. The cattle exhibits will be perhaps equalled in the history of the Island and several very fine herds from the neighboring provinces are in the stalls.
