RIDDLED AEROPLANE WITH SHELLS. TOULON, France, Sept. 26—A new 75 millimetre gun designed for the destruction of aeroplanes was tested yesterday and proved most satisfactory. An aeroplane, towed by a destroyer was riddled with shells when at a height of more than 1,500 metres, (about 5,000 feet.)

RETURNS FROM THE FAR NORTH

SYDNEY, Sept. 26—Professor MacMillan, who accompanied Commander Peary on his trip to the Pole, arrived this morning from a three months' trip to Labrador. Professor MacMillan was accompanied by J. G. Small, of New England, who built the 26 foot motor boat in which the trip was made. They left Sydney on June 24th, going first to St. Paul's Island, thence to Cape Ray, and from there up the coast to Labrador and to Battle Harbor. Heavy ice was encountered near here and the weather all thru was very stormy. Professor MacMillan's mission was ornithological and ethnological. He visited several Moravian mission stations, studying the Eskimoes. He left his boat at Battle Harbor, where he will call for it next year, when he leaves here with the Crackerland expedition. This expedition is to occupy two years, during which a search is to be made for a new land in the Polar sea, which Peary claims he saw, and the interior of Greenland will be explored. The present trip was made in the interest of Harvard University and the American Museum of Natural History. The party covered 2,600 miles in all in their little motor boat.
