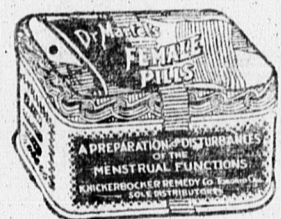
MARRIAGES

SNOW FALLING IN TEXAS.—Snow is reported falling in many parts of West Texas and indications were said to point to a severe blizzard in the cattle country.



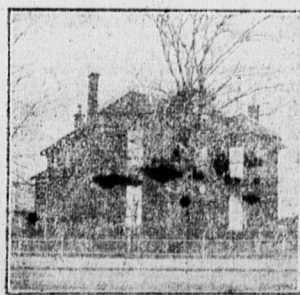

Hints for the Motorist

HOW "SHORT" CAN YOU STOP YOUR CAR?

The Police Are "Fussy" About This, And Rightly So.

With brakes in perfect condition and an ideal dry, even and level road surface, there is a certain theoretical minimum distance within which it is possible to stop a car. This distance depends principally upon the speed at which the car is moving at the instance of brake application but also upon the proportion of the total car weight that is carried by the wheels that are braked (the rear wheels). The total weight of the car is not a consideration, assuming that all cars have brakes capable of locking their wheels. The ordinary passenger car is generally assumed to carry one-half its total weight on each axle or somewhat more on the rear axle when fully loaded. When road conditions are as assumed above, the actual stopping distances test out in fairly close agreement with the theoretical and the figures obtained by experiment and computation are made the basis for the braking requirements imposed by the traffic authorities for motorists. A very easily remembered fact is that a car moving at 10 m. p. h. should be capable of being stopped in 10 feet or even slightly less, the exact distance depending upon the assumed division of weight between the two axles and the value taken from the adhesion of the tires to the roadway, one striking fact, as bearing upon the dangers of high speed is this: Doubling car speed increases the stopping distances four times, tripling increases the distance nine times and quadrupling it increases it sixteen times. Thus assuming a stopping distance of 10 feet at 10 m. p. h., at 20 m. p. h. it becomes 40 feet, at 30 m. p. h. 90 feet and at 40 m. p. h. 160 feet. In other words, the stopping distance increases with the square of the speed and a car running at 60 m. p. h. requires, at least, a distance of 250 feet or the length of a fair sized city block to stop in. Remember that these distances are minimum distances, obtained by assuming a dry firm road surface with no grade, brakes that can instantly lock the wheels and no excess of load in the front compartment. With poorly working brakes on the ascending, slippery road the distances given above might be increased several times.

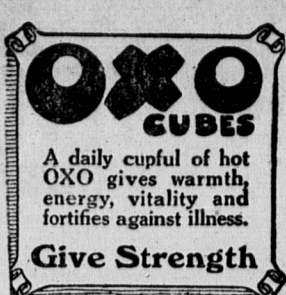

STANDARD OIL CO. WILL REDUCE PAY.—The Standard Oil Co. is to cut wages of all it employs in all parts of the United States in which it operates ten per cent., according to information which has reached Bayonne and Elizabeth (N. J.) The reduction will be made effective by the withdrawal of the second of two ten per cent. bonuses granted during the war. The employees have held meetings already to consider the cut, but no action has been taken by them. The Bayonne plants employ 5,000 men, the Elizabeth plant 2,200, the Eagle refinery in Jersey City, 2,000. The total number employed by the Standard Oil interests in the United States is about 100,000.

BRITISH GIRLS IN ALBERTA.—One hundred and sixty-three British girls were brought to Regina last year and sent to positions as household workers in the province according to a report submitted to the Local Council of Women. Ninety per cent have proven satisfactory.

CANADIANS IN BIG GOLD COAST WORKS.—Fifty Million dollars will be entrusted by the British Government to the Canadian firm of Stewart & MacDonnell, headed by Major-General J. W. Stewart, C. B., to be expended on enormous engineering works in gold coast colony on the west coast of Africa General Stewart has returned from England after making final arrangements for the carrying out of the first unit of the great harbor works at Takoradi. This unit will cost \$17,000,000, and will take from five to six years to complete. General Stewart stated that as far as possible Canadian material and equipment will be used in the work. Canadian cars, steam shovels, locomotives, cement and iron will be shipped in immense quantities, while British Columbia Douglas fir will be utilized. The first cargo of British Columbia timber will be shipped from here as soon as shipping is available. While for the most part negro labor will be employed, the heads of departments will be Canadians and the first thirty officials will leave shortly in time to reach the gold coast by April. In charge of the work for the first year will be Angus McDonnell, a well known former resident of British Columbia.

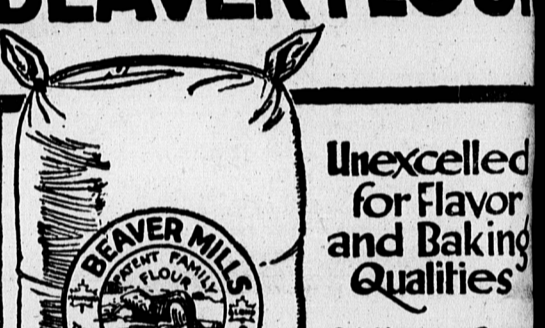

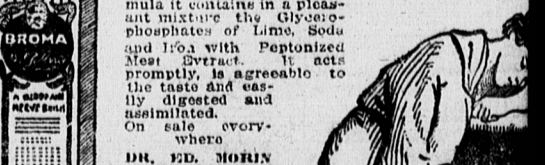
