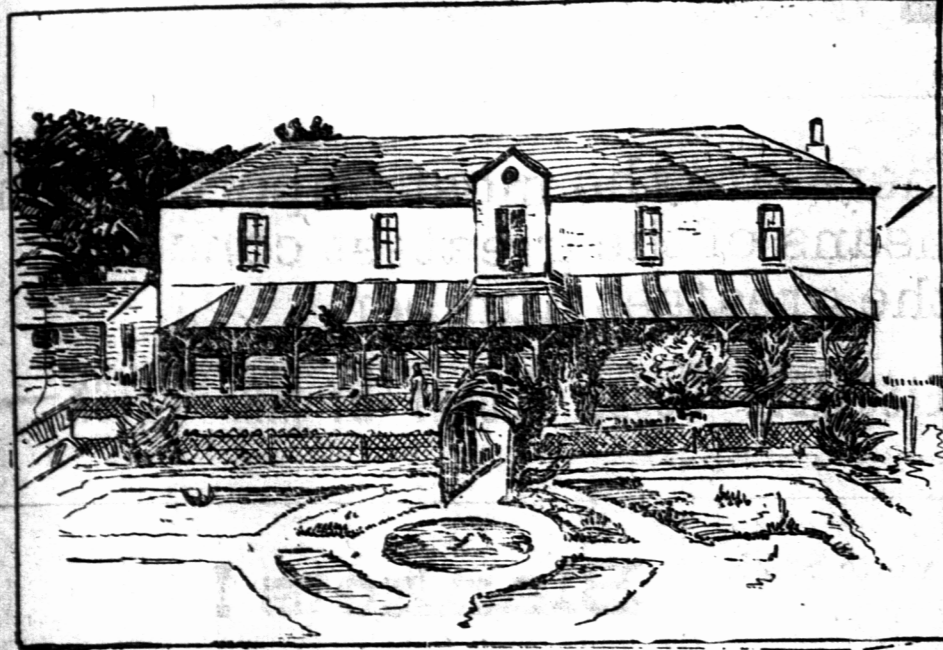

Wrecks on the Lakes.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—(Special)—A number of vessels on the Lakes have been wrecked by the great storms raging there.

There is also a considerable loss of life, but no definite list is yet prepared.

Spaniards Throng to Cuba.

HAVANA, Nov. 3.—(Special)—Since January 30,000 able-bodied Spaniards have arrived here and about 4,000 have left Cuba.

Drowned at a Ferry.

A New Poem By Kipling.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Rudyard Kipling has written a poem, which will be sold on behalf of the fund for the benefit of the widows and orphans of soldiers killed in South Africa. It is an appeal in the style of the "Barrack-room Ballads" for the women and children Tommy Atkins has left behind. The last stanza reads:

Let us manage so as later we can look him in the face,

And tell him what he'd very much prefer;

That while he saved the Empire, his employers saved his place,

And his mates, that you and me, looked out for her.

He's an absent-minded beggar, and he may forget it all,

But we do not want his kiddies to remind him

That we sent 'em to the work-house while their daddy hammered Paul

So we'll help the homes our Tommy's left behind him.

Each stanza has a separate refrain, of which the following is a sample:

Cook's son, duke's son, son of a belted earl,

Son of a Lambeth publican, it's all the same today;

Each of 'em doing his country's work, and who's to look after the girl?

Pass the hat for your credit's sake, and pay, pay, pay!

MANUAL TRAINING.

School to be Established in Charlottetown

Headquarters of the Experiment to be in Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—At to-night's meeting of the public school board, Prof. Robertson submitted a scheme for the establishment of a school of manual instruction in the capital. This is to be the pioneer school, but others will be established throughout the country. In England and Scotland they are conducted with marked success, and steps are being taken to introduce them into Ireland.

These schools are to be carried on by private subscription, Sir W. C. McDonald, Montreal, have deposited the necessary capital in the bank to permit of Prof. Robertson going ahead. The headquarters of the experiment will be in Ottawa. The Ontario centre will be Brockville. The other provincial centres will be Montreal, Fredericton, N. B., Truro, N. S., Charlottetown, P. E. I., Winnipeg or Brandon, Calgary and Victoria or Vancouver.
