## BANDITS LOOT MEXICAN TOWN

CITY OF MEXICO, June 28—According to telegraphic advices which were received by Vice President Corral, one of the boldest bandit raids ever attempted in the history of Mexico was successfully carried out when the town of Victoria was assaulted and looted yesterday. The bandits numbering 15 all well armed and mounted, swooped down upon the town without warning. A few feeble resistance was made but after three of them were killed and three mortally wounded the marauders probably had things all their own way.
