# Mayor Duggan of Edmonton Charged With Bribery

EDMONTON, Jan. 25.—Charging Mayor D. M. Duggan with having practised bribery and corruption in the recent elections, Hyman King, through his attorneys, R. F. Jackson and Company, this afternoon presented a writ to Mr. Justice Tweedie in the Supreme Court asking that the election of Mr. Duggan to the position of mayor be nullified.

According to the petition the mayor was not legally elected and he and others are charged with preparing a voters' list which was contrary to the city charter. It is further alleged that Mr. Duggan was guilty of bribery in promising that he would have the Rev. George Slater appointed to a position on the Hospital Board, the inference alleged in connection with this charge being that Mr. Slater would use his influence in respect to securing the colored vote for the mayor.

Another charge is that bribery was committed by the hiring of a large number of taxicabs to convey voters to the polls, and another charge is that the mayor proposed positions to a number of people.

# QUESTION RAISED BY ROYAL WEDDING

LONDON, Jan. 26.—The coming marriage of the Duke of York to Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, daughter of the Earl of Strathmore, brings before the public a question which has not arisen in many years, but which, in times past, has been a point of difference between the Crown and Parliament. This question is the financial support of a younger member of the royal family.

The Prince of Wales has his own estates, appertaining to his title, which are sufficient for his support. Princess Mary carried one in the kingdom, the Duchy of Lancaster, so there was no difficulty in her case, although King George had precedents aplenty for going to Parliament for a money grant if he had thought it necessary to do so.

The King's younger sons in the past have had their own starting households appropriate to their stations in life, and Parliament felt that their father must finance them from his own fortune. Although King George's wealth is a matter of guesswork, he probably might well afford to launch his sons in life financially if it was judged by ordinary standards; but custom, strong in England, entitles him to expect that national exchequer for the national exchequer.

Custom forbids the King's sons to work for a living, except in such employment as the army or navy, where the pay is insignificant. It also compels them to live up to their position.

The embarrassing duty fell on Queen Victoria of approaching Parliament for grants for her younger children and also, because she remained so long in the Throne, for her grand children, the daughters of King Edward. On every occasion there was opposition in Parliament, which grieved and irritated the Queen. Even in those days there were radical members of the House of Commons who insisted on asking what these minor members of the royal family did for the nation to earn their living upkeep.

With Labour members constituting the second party in the lower House of Parliament, and with more than a million unemployed in the country, any proposal to finance the Duke of York on any princely scale either in the form of a lump sum or an annuity, is certain to bring on disagreeable debate. The Duke has no great fortune of his own, nor has his bride-to-be.

# INCREASED LOGGING OPERATIONS.

TORONTO, Jan. 26.—There will be between 900 and 1,000 logging camps in Ontario this winter, owing to increased logging operations, according to A. R. White, senior inspector of the Provincial Department of Health. The recent activity in the pulp and paper industry as well as building activities all over the Dominion, is responsible for the increase in logging camps.

# Terrible Tragedy in an Irish Home

BELFAST, Jan. 25.—The history of the civil strife in Ireland has brought forth no tragedy which for its bitter irony surpasses an incident reported from Galway.

A laborer sold a litter of pigs at the market in Portunna, receiving in payment £40. The same night his house was raided by four masked men who demanded £40 on the peril of his life. Tremblingly he delivered the money, and the raiders departed.

As the last man was leaving the young son of the house seized an axe and struck him, killing him instantly, whereupon his companions fled. Removing the mask, the members of the family discovered that the dead bandit was the laborer's second son.

# Beauty's Wily Ways 200,000 Years Ago

OTTAWA, Jan. 25.—Two hundred thousand years ago the pretty girls and women wore syncopated skirts, faded colored coques for a variety of purposes and in general were as up-to-date as the young women of today. Their suppleness of figure is apparent from the numerous etchings discovered in caves and other places that are known to have belonged to the stone age period.

The foregoing were statements made by Dr. MacGillivray, of Queen's University in speaking here Friday evening before the Ottawa Teachers' Institute.

Dr. MacGillivray, who spoke on the development of man, traced the development down through the various ages. The mixture of races touched upon, while the traces of the early animal nature that is still existent was evidenced by the terrible atrocities of the last war.

That man has not advanced a great deal from the early stone age period in some parts of the world was demonstrated by the mode of dwelling of some of the aborigines living in different parts of the world.

COBLENZ, Jan. 25.—A fine 50-room castle on the Rhine opposite Coblenz together with its furnishings and 15 acres of vineyards is advertised for sale for \$1,000. F. # Allege Postmaster Needed Money Badly

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 25.—George Armstrong, local postmaster, charged with the theft of \$50,000 from registered mails during August, 1919, was hard pressed for money and endeavored to raise a large loan shortly before the alleged robbery was reported, according to evidence given by D. W. Warner, M. P., of Cloverbar, Alta., at the preliminary hearing now proceeding.

Armstrong, according to Mr. Warner, tried to get a loan on his property and also offered to sell it. After lengthy questioning, Mr. Warner said the postmaster had asked him for \$50,000. "For God's sake, Warner, let me have the money, I need it," is how the witness said that Armstrong made his appeal. The matter was discussed several times, but the loan was not made.

The hearing so far has been occupied with the evidence of postal employees as to the receipt and storage of the letters containing the money forwarded from Winnipeg, addressed to the Merchants Bank here.

# Indoor Skating Championships Meets Awarded

ST. JOHN, Jan. 24.—The meeting of the executive of the Maritime Skating Association, in session in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday, awarded the maritime indoor skating championship to the St. John's A. # Fought Wolf Pack With a Gas Pipe

PORT ARTHUR, Jan. 2.—Thomas Squires, an engineer, mechanic at Canadian National elevator "B" on the south end water front here Saturday put a serious crimp in the theory that wolves will attack a man, when he turned attacker and killed one of a pack of six with a piece of gas pipe while the other five turned and with their tails between their legs, beat a hasty retreat for safety.

According to Squires' story, which is borne out by the employees of the elevator who witnessed the affair, a pack of six wolves appeared on the ice with a quarter of a mile of the shore line. Armed with the length of piping, Squires went out to them. Five of them turned as he approached but the sixth lingered a trifle longer than the others and fell a victim after Squires had given him a chase of several hundred feet.

"If the experience I had today is typical, there is nothing to that," Squires said. "They made no show of fight and the one I got gave me a merry run before I caught up to it."

It is supposed the wolves came in over the ice from one of the islands of the bay and were unaware they were nearing a centre of human population.

The wolves in the pack encountered by Mr. Squires are described as brush wolves, distinguished from timber wolves which are larger and generally credited with being more vicious.
