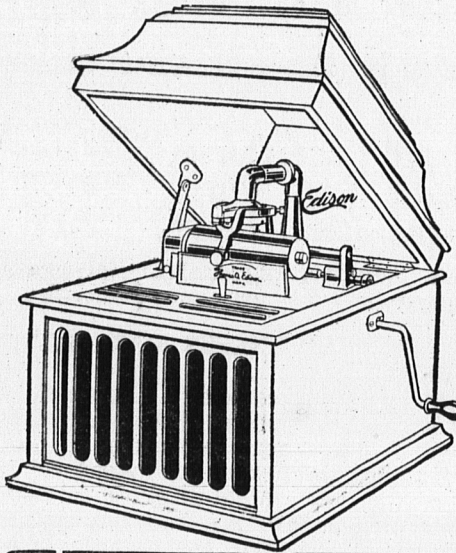

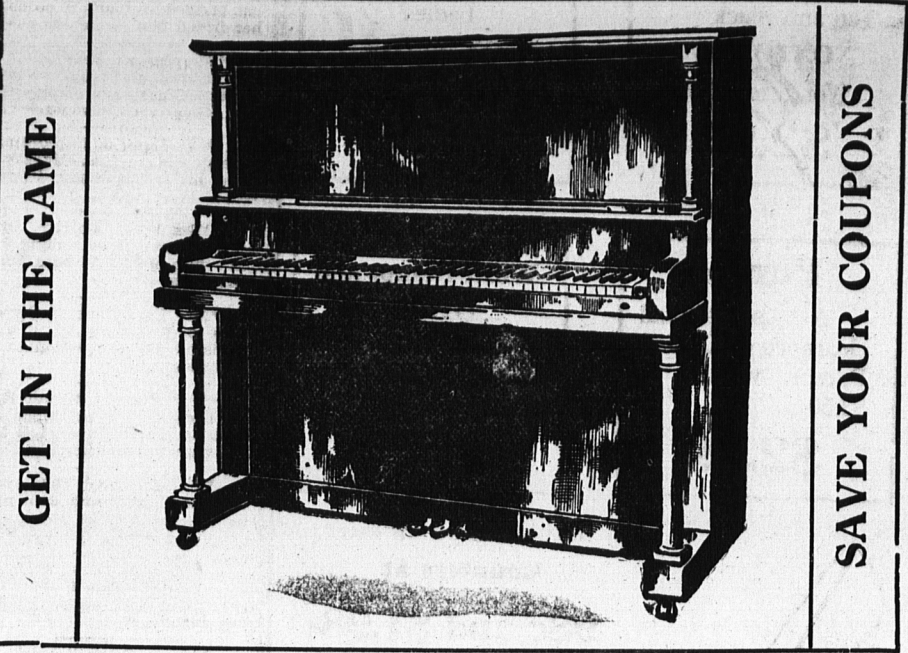

On the evening of Friday, July 23rd, this estimable Christian lady passed into "the rest which remaineth to the people of God." Life in the home, the church and community is the poorer for her departure. She was a member of the Cornwall Methodist Church from her youth up, interested and helpful in all its activities, but especially in the work of the Women's Missionary Society, for some years president of the Cornwall Auxiliary, and also for some years organizer for the Charlottetown District. Her health had been falling for about two years past and the end was neither unexpected nor unprepared for. She made her home with her brother, Mr. J. Pope Crosby, West River (she was widowed quite early). She had withstood with the skill of the physician and the loving care of dear ones could provide. The funeral services were held on Sunday, July 25th, at 11 o'clock, at the home of Mrs. J. Pope Crosby. There was a very large attendance and the service was conducted by her pastor, Rev. George Orman, who had appreciated very much her friendship and advice. The address was suggested by the following Scripture texts: "Who can find a virtuous woman for her price is far above rubies, Prov. 31: 10; She hath done what she could, Mark 14: 8; To be with Christ which is far better, Philippians 1: 23. The singing was very impressive by the Cornwall choir, Mrs. Frank Howard presiding at the organ. A special feature was the rendering of a quartette by the following: Mrs. Will Howard, soloist; Dr. Ayres, tenor; Mr. Harry Hyde, bass; Mrs. Hammond Crosby, alto.

HENRY JENKINS.

The late Henry Jenkins, whose death occurred at his residence, 128 Page street, San Francisco, Cal., on June 21 last, as announced in the last issue of The Maple Leaf, was a son of the late James G. Jenkins, shipbuilder, of Lot 49, and his wife, Jane J. Brehaut, of Alexandria, P. E. Island. In his young days, when shipbuilding on the Island gave employment to thousands of men, Henry was confidential bookkeeper for his father until he left home to try his fortune under the Stars and Stripes.

On March 16, 1871, Henry Jenkins was united in marriage to Miss Henrietta Conohan of Bay Fortune, P. E. I. The ceremony, taking place in Boston, Mass., and for over forty-four long years domestic happiness has reigned in the Jenkins household.

tracting and building business, afterwards removing to San Francisco, where he remained until his death. He retired from active business eighteen years ago, after a prosperous career. Four years ago, on the 19th of July, Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins left San Francisco to visit scenes and friends of their youth in their old island home. For six months they enjoyed the pleasures of that trip, returning to their western home greatly invigorated in mind and body. But shortly after their return, on December 29, 1911, Mr. Jenkins was stricken with apoplexy, and while for a time he improved in health, he never was the same active man. In October, 1914, he was stricken the second time, and again on the 4th of June, 1915, followed by his death eighteen days later.

Mr. Jenkins was a most affectionate husband and father, a man beloved by all who knew him, and much sympathy is extended to the bereaved widow who feels her loss so keenly, as well as to the sons, now happily married and in homes of their own. They are, E. L. Jenkins, for sixteen years auditor with the Pacific Mail S. S. Co. and H. G. Jenkins, in the building and loan business. Another son, Glen Jenkins, died six years and six months ago. He was a noted horseman and jockey, and known in racing circles the world over.
