Among the schooners which have wintered in Summerside and are now getting ready for their summer work, Schooner J. B. Martin owned by Jos. Read & Co., is being practically rebuilt. The schooner Enterprise owned by Capt. Wm. Mallet is having a new main mast put in and in other ways is being put in first class shape. The schooner James Stetson owned by C. B. Morris is undergoing repairs. The schooner Lizzie Catherine owned by R. Campbell & Sons, is being fitted with a new top mast. She is one of the finest schooners in the Maritime Province. The schooner Nellie Morrow, owned by Henry Smith, Ottawa, is being fitted up for the season's work. The schooner Lois and Telephone, owned by Joseph Read & Co., are shortly to undergo extensive repairs.

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council will be held Monday night, the Mayor and all the councillors being present. Bills to the amount of \$1598.88 cents were read approved and ordered to be paid. Councillor Arsenault thought there was too much extravagance going on and instanced the repairs to market hall amounting to over \$125 as being a little too steep.

Coun. Hinton, chairman of property committee explained that the work he thought was well done and that the bills were fair as the hall was in a very bad state of repair. Considerable discussion took place in this matter. A letter, from L. U. Fowler enclosing a bill of \$10 for rent of Ludlow hall in connection with the Seed Fair was laid over until next meeting. Coun. Hinton reported for the property committee that they had ordered and received lumber for repairs to wharf, that the Happyland Co., had leased Market Hall furnishing all bonds as required and that such repairs as had been needed had been made to the hall. Coun. Silliphant, chairman of Fire and Light Committee reported for petition on East Street. Couns. McNeill and Arsenault as members of this Committee said they had never been asked to look into this petition, but that the light had been placed and as far as they could see without authority. A motion was passed authorizing the clerk to notify the Electric Light Co., that the light so placed had not been ordered by the Council and would not be paid for until such time as they ordered it. Coun. McFarlane reported for the Street Committee that they had not placed any order for lumber as no dealer was able to fill it. They only had one offer for it and that was at \$1.50 per thousand. Coun. McNeill as chairman of the Finance and Purchasing Committee said that the expenses of the town to the end of last month exceeded that of last year for the same time by about \$89. He moved a motion that no Committee be authorized to spend more than \$10 per month except on order from the Council. Considerable discussion took place on the report of the petition for lights on town Wharf and the report was laid over until next meeting. After which Council adjourned.

R. Weather's, Carlisle, over night, leaving there on Tuesday, May 12th, at 10 a.m. for Royal Hotel Stables, Montague, arriving here about noon, and remaining there until Wednesday morning until 9.30, when he will proceed to Simon D Campbell's, Uigg, noon, remaining there until 4 p.m.
