ANGLO JAPANESE EAST ALLIANCE

Terms of the Treaty Published Some Time Ago

A Warning to the Russian Bear not to Make Further Encroachment on Her Eastern Territory.

In view of the present situation in the Far East the publication of the following treaty between England and Japan will be of great interest. When the situation became acute some years ago Great Britain restrained her Japanese friends, going so far as to say that she must refuse them assistance because her energies were entirely occupied in the South African war. It was then and not till then that Japan made the best possible terms with Russia relative to Korea and abandoned the idea of interference in Manchuria.

The treaty furnishes the wholesome news that Great Britain and Japan are determined not to permit Russia to encroach territorially in China. The following are the terms of the agreement which was signed in London on January 30:

"The Governments of Great Britain and Japan, actuated solely by a desire to maintain the status quo and general peace in the extreme East, and being, moreover, especially interested in maintaining the independence and territorial integrity of China and Korea, and in securing equal opportunities in those countries for the commerce and industry of all nations, hereby agree as follows:

"Article I.—The high contracting parties having mutually recognized the independence of China and Korea, declare themselves to be entirely uninfluenced by any aggressive tendencies in either country. Having in view, however, their special interests, of which those of Great Britain relate principally to China, while Japan in addition to the interests she possesses in China, is interested in a peculiar degree, politically as well as commercially and industrially, in Korea, the signatories recognize that it will be advisable for either of them to take such measures as may be indispensable in order to safeguard those interests if these be threatened either by the aggressive action of any other power or by disturbances arising in China or Korea, necessitating the intervention of either of the contracting parties for the protection of the lives and property of its subjects.

he was attending school at night when off duty and by hard study he qualified himself to enter the University of California where he very successfully took the degree of M. D. After taking his medical degree he settled in Placerville where he had a very large practice and by his amiable disposition won a large circle of friends as was shown by letters of condolence sent to his bereaved father, especially by Dr. Mountain, the physician who attended on him during his illness of six weeks. Dr. Mountain reported that Dr. McLean died of regular continued fever and fatty degeneration of the heart. When in California he joined the Free Masons and at his funeral from his father's house the brethren of the Masonic order at Montague and vicinity turned out in a large force and had as customary their burial service read at his grave. Rev. J. Sutherland conducted service at the house and had prayer at the grave. The great sympathy felt for Mr. McLean and family was shown by the large number who attended the funeral. The departed who was a very dutiful son has left an aged father and mother, two brothers and three sisters with their husbands to mourn their loss. He was 37 years of age, in the prime of life.

Of him a recent issue of the Democrat, Placerville El Dorado County, Cal. says: Death has claimed another shining mark. This time it was Dr. Murdock McLean, a favorite physician among the many good ones of this city, who were his trusted friends and attendants and who now sadly deplore his untimely death. For about six weeks he had suffered from a malignant type of malarial fever, that baffled the most attentive and skillful treatment. An outing at the Pacific House, was succeeded on his return to the Ohio House, where he had long been a favorite guest, with more alarming symptoms and suffering. And finally a rapid decline from last Saturday until Sunday resulted in his lamented death, which drenched a thousand hearts and homes in this city and county.

He was a native of Prince Edward Island, whence he came to San Francisco about 16 years ago at twenty years of age. There from sundry industrial employments, he entered the University of California, graduating from the medical department in 1877. Coming thence to Georgetown, he practiced there about two years, then located in this city after buying out Dr. I. M. Erctor, where the last four years of his professional life was spent. He was a sunny-souled and genial gentleman in feeling and manners. Prompt and thorough in his profession, he was eminently successful. He was a member of El Dorado Lodge No. 28, F. and A. M. of Fallen Leaf Chapter, No. 90, O. E. S. and of Court Confidence No. 117, F. of A.—in all of which his death is deeply deplored.

In his far away island home, his stricken parents, three loving sisters and two brothers await the arrival of all that remains of their sturdy, stalwart son and brother under escort of his brother-in-law, Mr. J. McPherson, who came from San Francisco for that purpose. His body lay in his office Tuesday, and until late in the evening, during which time many looked upon the face they had so often seen light up in kindly greeting, now calm and peaceful in its last repose; and after the flower-laden casket had been prepared for its long journey, on Wednesday morning just as the sun broke over the hills, the train bore from this, his adopted home, all that was mortal of Murdock McLean.
