Desert Is Foe Of Both Sides; Favors British

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN THE WESTERN DESERT, Egypt, Oct. 16 (CP)—(Reuters)—It is difficult to convey to those with no experience of the rigors of the desert the exhausting conditions under which both the Italians and British armies are forced to exist.

The desert is the relentless foe of both sides and the side which takes the offensive suffers the most. The enemy is groping his way forward in an unknown wilderness of sand, harassed by British outposts and experiencing those extreme bodily discomforts which British troops bore with such fortitude during the first phase of the war when they penetrated far into Libya.

Hitherto British armored units have seen most action; but now British gunners are being given the opportunity of demonstrating their capabilities and the remarkable accuracy of their fire.

When the Italians attempted with cruiser tanks to descend the road leading to the shore from the encampment at Sollum British artillery destroyed with direct hits the first three Italian tanks.

The enemy thereupon tried to lower the rest of his tanks with the aid of a large derrick; but was forced to desist when the gunners scored a direct hit on a cruiser tank as it was dangling in mid-air over the precipice.

One night the crew of a British forward battery in a position on the coast were enjoying tea and cigarettes when they saw several cruiser tanks. They thought the tanks were British—and carried on with their work.

Suddenly, at close range, the tanks opened fire. They sprang to their guns and after the first couple of salvos the advancing force of enemy tanks halted. The gunners limbered up and split, some going north, others south.

They soon found a perfect target such as they had never experienced before—an enemy machine gun column, in close formation advancing behind the cruiser tanks which the gunners had just halted.

The British gunners again opened fire and inflicted much damage on the Italian vehicles and upon the troops who left the vehicles and attacked on foot in the face of devastating fire.

Although many of the enemy fell, they displayed a great bravery and continued to advance, shoulder to shoulder in a solid mass, until they suddenly came under withering fire from a chain of British machine-gun nests which moved them down at almost point blank range.

Deadlock Continues Re Fair Buildings

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 16 (CP)—Directors of the Maritime stock breeders association and the Amherst winter air commission conferred today but failed to break the deadlock over certain buildings purchased and renovated by the commission before the new arena was built two years ago on land from which the buildings had been removed.

Stock breeders directors expressed the opinion the commission had been "unbusiness-like" as well as extravagant in their arrangements, while the commissioners held they made the best arrangements possible under the circumstances.

The meeting concluded with the stock breeders still unwilling to accept the commission's financial report. Members of the stock breeders association present were C. F. Bailey of Fredericton, Major A. W. MacKenzie of Truro, Dr. L. A. Donovan of Saint John, N. B., Walter Dickie of Victoria, P.E.I., and L. R. Rose of Oakfield, N. S.

CHURCH SOCIETY FOR TEMPERANCE TORONTO, Oct. 17 (CP)—Arrangements are proceeding for the establishment of a Canadian Church of England Temperance Society, as authorized by the General Synod. The Society, like the parent body in England, will emphasize temperance rather than total abstinence, though recognizing the desirability of the latter as a voluntary contribution to the war needs of the country.

SOLDIER TYPISTS BACK AT SCHOOL LONDON, Oct. 16—(CP) Preparing for clerical positions in England, 40 Canadian soldiers are undergoing an intensive course in office training at the Balham and Tooting School of Commerce in London. They go back to school for eight hours a day, studying shorthand, typing and English. Frank Geary, principal of the school, described the soldiers as a "fine lot of chaps" and said "we get on very well with all of them." They have only three months in hand to attain quite a high standard," Geary said. "They must be able to type at 80-40 words a minute and write shorthand at between 90 and 100 words a minute."

Teach Wireless For War Effort

WINNIPEG, Oct. 17 (CP)—Lame since childhood from an attack of infantile paralysis and rejected by the Army and Air Force, Percy Whitebread, Winnipeg telegraph messenger, is making an unusual contribution to Canada's war effort.

He and his wife, Evelyn, are amateur wireless operators and since last October have given all their spare time to teaching lads who want to become operators in the war services. They have "graduated" 45 men already and are turning out another batch every five weeks.

The school is conducted in the two-room apartment where they live with their seven-year-old daughter, Patsie. Both work during the daytime, but have given up their leisure time to give classes each evening and on Saturday afternoons and Sundays.

Among the graduates there have been elevator operators, messenger boys, clerks, store proprietors and even a model. One lad, "Fuzzy" Harrison travels 30 miles from his home in Starbuck, west of here, to attend the evening classes.

So far, the Whitebreads have not had a single failure. The instruction is given absolutely free. All they ask is that their pupils send them pictures when they get into uniform.

U. S. To Elect 33 Governors Nov. 5 Voting

NEW YORK, Oct. 17 (CP)—Thirty-three governorships, an unusually high number in one day's polling, will be at stake in the United States general election Nov. 5. A 34th, Maine, was filled Sept. 9 with the election of Sumner Sewall, a Republican.

These contests, while overshadowed by the presidential campaign, are important to the closely-knit national party organizations, and to the candidates themselves, in view of the fact that many men use the governor's chair as a stepping place to national prominence—in the Senate, the Diplomatic Service, the Higher Courts and even the Presidency.

More than 80 candidates, including minor party nominees, will contest for the 33 governorships to be voted on next month. They include a former secretary of the Navy.

The Eastern Guardian Praises Work Of Firewomen In War Zone

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (CP)—The fireman of Canada and the United States is awakening to the fact that modern warfare's changed technique is casting him—and the firewoman, too—into prominence among a nation's defenders.

This is the opinion of George Richardson, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Fire Fighters, which has a large membership in Canada.
