MILITARY POLICE AT BORDER TO BE WITHDRAWN AT ONCE

WINDSOR, July 28.—Military police who have been on duty at Windsor and Walkerville ferry docks for the past three years, will be withdrawn Friday, according to orders received today by Sergt. J. Whittle, in charge of the squad of ten policemen.

Records on file at the armouries show that the military police rounded up hundreds of "slackers" and deserters while on duty at the ferry docks. Would-be evaders of the draft who attempted to cross to Detroit numbered several thousand, their methods of trying to get past officers varying from use of female attire to using crutches.

Since the armistice was signed the work has consisted principally of looking after uniformed men, but several "skeddaddlers," who returned to the Dominion, fell into the clutches of the police.

Plot to Wreck C.N.R. Trains

MONTREAL, July 29.—That efforts are being made to wreck trains on the intercolonial section of the Canadian National Railways is the opinion of the high officials of the system in Montreal, following the mishap to the Maritime Express near St. Rosalie on Sunday night. The C. N. E. train was thrown off the main track on to a siding east of St. Rosalie, two miles east of St. Hyacinthe. The engine was derailed, and the only other damage was to several box cars on the siding.

What makes the situation more serious is the report which reached the head office in Montreal today. The engineer reports that when approaching the switch point he saw a white light, and then suddenly a red light was shown, and he believed he saw the figure of a man running away in the darkness. It was then 9:30 and it was impossible to see clearly. Examination of the switch showed that the mechanism of the switch was in perfect running order and further
