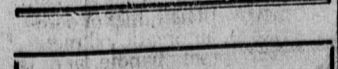

Heritage that has been bought by splendid sacrifices in the ages that lie behind us. (Loud Cheers.) Rev. Dr. Gauthier was next asked to address the meeting. He made a very brief speech, but it was fraught with fervour and patriotism. He recognized the stupendous nature of the war, and he was confident that the people would exert their utmost efforts to aid the Mother Country as much as possible.

Mr. J. W. F. Tidmarsh said that there was no better opportunity to open a subscription list than at that meeting. Mr. Fitzgerald considered the chairman's suggestion a very good idea, for this reason: they could not go to the country and ask the farmers to give them subscriptions unless they began with subscriptions there first.

His Honour Lieutenant-Governor Rogers said that it was his firm belief that the people of the Island would respond generously to the call for help and would give according to their means. He knew one man who was willing and ready to give five tons of hay.

THE GIFT OF MEN.

Colonel F. S. Moore made a short but impressive speech. There was one gift that they had not heard very much of, but without which there would be no British Empire. That was the gift of men. (Cheers.) Prince Edward Island had been asked, as it was fifteen years ago, to send its manhood in defense of the Empire.

At this stage the General Committee returned and made certain recommendations. The presidents of the committees which they had appointed were as follows: General President, Executive Committee, Hon. Murdoch McKinnon; Pres. for King's, Hon. John McLean; Pres. for Queen's, Alex. Martin; Pres. for Prince, Hon. John Richards.

20,000 AUSTRIAN CASUALTIES

LONDON, Sept. 11.—A despatch to the Daily News from Rome declares that news has been received there from Bucharest, Roumania, setting forth that the Russians have inflicted a crushing defeat on the Austrians in Galicia. They inflicted a loss of 20,000 on the enemy who sought to cross the Vistula.

NUMERICAL UNITS OF OPPOSING ARMIES

In order to inform the ordinary reader about the size of the various subdivisions of foreign armies, such as corps, divisions, brigades, regiments, battalions, we present here with a table which gives as accurately as possible the number of men and the composition in such divisions:

Great Britain Brigade of Infantry—Four battalions and administrative and medical units. Total, 4,000 men. Cavalry Brigade—Two regiments of 4 squadrons each. Total, 800 men.

France Army Corps—Two infantry divisions, 1 brigade of cavalry, 1 brigade of horse and foot artillery, 1 engineers' battalion, 1 squadron of train. Total, 40,000 men.

Russia Regiment—Three battalions of 4 companies each. Total, 3,000 men. Battalion—Four companies of 250 men each. Total, 1,000 men.

Germany Army Corps—Its staff, 2 infantry divisions, 2 regiments of field artillery, 3 squadrons of cavalry, a company of pioneers, a bridge train, field bakeries, telegraph troops, field hospital, etc., one or two batteries of heavy field howitzers or mortars and a machine gun group. Total, 40,000 men.

United States Regiment of Field Artillery—Nine batteries of field guns and 3 of field howitzers; 72 pieces. Battery—Six guns. Brigade of Cavalry—Two and occasionally three regiments. Total, 1,000 to 2,400 men.

Regiment of Cavalry—Four squadrons of 200 men each. Total, 800 men. Brigade—Two regiments. Total, 6,000 men.

Regiment—Three battalions of 4 companies each. Total, 3,000 men. Battalion—Four companies of 250 men each. Total, 1,000 men.

Regiment of Field Artillery—Nine batteries of field guns and 3 of field howitzers; 72 pieces. Battery—Six guns. Brigade of Cavalry—Two and occasionally three regiments. Total, 1,000 to 2,400 men.

Table listing names and amounts of contributions to the fund, including Sir W. Sullivan (\$100.00), Hon. R. Fitzgerald (\$50.00), Mr. Alex. Martin (\$50.00), etc.

Total \$2,532.50 After heartily singing the National Anthem, the meeting terminated.

Let them explain that notwithstanding the war the people of Canada CAN have "the pie"—"home-made pie," and all the better for being home-made. And after the war is over—if not before—perhaps our neighbors in Europe will be coming to Canada for some of this "pie"—importing from Canada some of the things Canada now imports from them.
