MAGDALEN ISLANDS ARE WITHOUT FISHING SUPPLIES

The question of supplies for the fishermen of the Magdalen Islands was brought to the attention of the Senate in Ottawa, Friday by Senator McLean, of Prince Edward Island. He stated that the supplies for the season's fishing, including gasoline needed for fishing boats were on board the government steamer Canadian Sealer, now lying at Pictou, with a captain, but no crew. There were 6,500 people on the Magdalens depending on fishing; the lobster season had opened and the supplies should have reached the magdalens last week.

BRITISH ARMY STORES STOLEN AND DESTROYED

LONDON, April 26.—Over 13,000,000 dollars worth of British Army stores were lost by theft, arson, fraud, negligence or other causes in the year ending March 31st, 1919.

This astonishing statement appears in the Auditor-General's report on Army accounts. The articles stolen included motor trucks, automobiles, horses, mules, blankets, rum, cash, food, fuel, and cigarettes.

Negligence in guarding dumps resulted in wholesale pilfering, the report states. Quantities of stores were also lost through fires at 18 camps and depots. Train robberies in France counted for \$30,000 dollars. Losses at sea and food condemned or ruined through being stacked in the open, are other items in the loss account.

WILL SALVAGE GREEK STEAMER.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 30.—With favorable weather the Atlantic Salvage Company expect to have the Greek steamer Platea, which went ashore on Sable Island last fall, safe in Halifax harbor by the middle of May. Few ships have ever been salvaged from the graveyard of the Atlantic.
