McGILL PLANS MEDICAL EXHIBIT

MONTREAL, Oct. 19.—An interesting medical exhibit is being prepared by the Pathological Institute of McGill University, in readiness for the forthcoming convention in this city of the American College of Surgeons. The exhibit will consist of a series of bone tumors or bones sarcoma. In addition to mounted specimens there will be X-ray pictures taken of the subject during life, and lantern slide views of dissected specimens, specially arranged.

There has recently been a classification of malignant tumors agreed upon by the American College of Surgeons and the special exhibit prepared by McGill will fully illustrate this.

Formerly every physician had his own classification or his own terminology to describe bone tumors, it is pointed out, but now the Committee of the American College of Surgeons has decided in favor of using the same terminology to describe the same thing.

The classification of bone tumors which the Pathological Institute of McGill will illustrate is called the Codman classification, after Dr. E. E. Codman, of Boston, who initiated and has conducted for five years the activity of the American College of Surgeons called "The Registry of Bone Sarcoma."

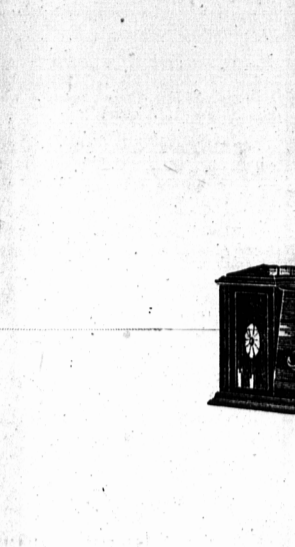

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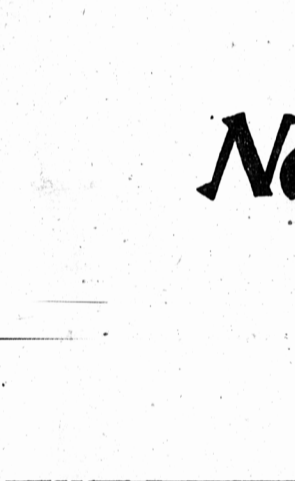

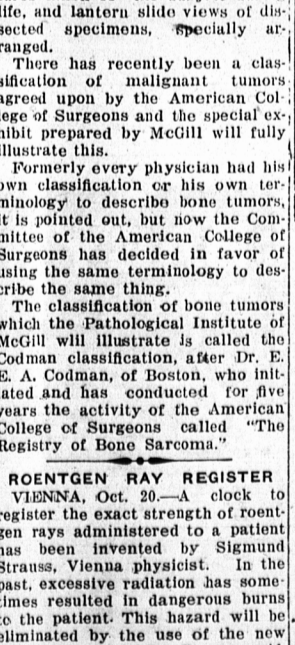
