**ISLAND IS SEPARATE DISTRICT NOW**

Was, Until April 1st Sub District of Income Tax Division—"Mounties" Now in Attendance.

Since the Income Tax Act was inaugurated on Jan. 1st, 1917, Prince Edward Island has been a sub-district of the Halifax district, of the Income Tax Division of Department of National Revenue, and on April 1st of this year, the Island became a full district, under the title of the Charlottetown district. All matters pertaining to Income Tax affecting this province are now dealt with by the Charlottetown Office.

Mr. G. E. Ritchie, who has been in the Income Tax service for the past ten years, has been placed in charge of the office as Acting Inspector. Mr. Percy Pope has been appointed Assistant Inspector and Mr. A. B. Cosh Chief Assessor.

It is one of the rulings of the Department of National Revenue that mounted police must be present when taxes are being collected in any district. According to a detachment of three "mounties" consisting of two troopers under the command of Sgt. Major Myers are on duty at the Income Tax Office, they being sent for the first time by reason of the fact that this is the first year the Island is a separate district.

Mr. H. C. Hogarth, the assistant Chief Inspector of the Income Tax Division at Ottawa, together with Mr. Lawrence Allen have been here for the past few weeks arranging the transfer from Halifax, and instructing the staff in their new duties.

All are reminded that income tax returns are due April 30th, and to obtain proper attention and assistance from the staff, they should be filed without delay.

**Security House**  
**Opens Office**

The Willis Securities Company's New Branch Located At 79 Queen Street Opens Doors For First Time Yesterday.

Yesterday the Willis Securities Co., Ltd., opened its Charlottetown branch office at 79 Queen Street. It is safe to say that the establishment is the last word in branch offices of this kind. It is divided into two rooms—the board room in front where the business is transacted, and a smaller office in the rear for the manager.

The principal feature of the board room—and that, in fact from which it takes its name—is the board on which quotations are listed. This is 32 feet in length, occupying the whole south side of the office, and is divided into one hundred and twenty compartments on which the successive quotations are listed. It is made of a patent cloth, of a dull green, which colour has been found to be most restful to the eyes.

Above it is a slot running its full length, in which celluloid tickets will be inserted, giving the names of the various stocks listed.

The floor is covered with gray and white inlaid linoleum, and the furniture and interior wood trimmings are of the finest mahogany. The lighting, it goes without saying, is of the most up to date character.

A bulletin board, with desk is provided on which will be posted the latest information of interest to investors, together with the most reliable financial newspapers and journals.

When the equipment of the office is completed it will be supplied with the teletype system—the very last word in transmitting apparatus for offices of this kind. school inspectors. I am just informed that this is the first year that the inspectors have been paid under the technical grant.

Mr. Stewart: So my hon. friend was wrong as to that item. Of course, that makes a difference. On what principle do you pay the inspectors? Do you pay the full salary of the three new ones, or do you pay part salaries to the whole nine?

Premier Saunders: The full salaries are paid to the inspectors out of the technical grant.

Mr. Stewart: How many?

Premier Saunders: Eight.

Mr. Stewart: So there is now only one school inspector paid out of ordinary revenue?

Premier Saunders: One; the lady inspector.

Dr. MacMillan: I find there are ten inspectors; so that nine of them must be paid out of this grant. I would like to ask, in connection with this matter, if Joseph F. Doyle is now a school inspector, if he is not, who has been appointed in his place and why was he dismissed?

Premier Saunders: I think, if my hon. friend will leave that until we come to the educational items I shall be glad to give him the answer.

Dr. MacMillan: Very well. Might I ask who are the ladies in charge of the Women's Institute?

Premier Saunders: Miss Schurman is supervisor and Miss MacPhail is assistant.

Dr. MacMillan: Both Islanders?

Premier Saunders: Miss MacPhail is from New Brunswick.

Dr. MacMillan: Why?

Premier Saunders: Because there was no one on the Island to take the position?

Dr. MacMillan: No one in this Province qualified?

Premier Saunders: No one qualified at the time; no one who would take it.

Dr. MacMillan: And you had to send to New Brunswick for a girl to occupy this position?

Premier Saunders: She is there at any rate.

Seed Grain Purchased Without Authority

Mr. Stewart: There is an item in the Accounts for seed grain. That has been mentioned before in this House. The idea was no doubt a good one; we are not criticising the principle, it was done by previous administrations. What I do criticise, however, is the fact that it was done without authority. There is a large expenditure here of nearly \$35,000, and that expenditure was made, I believe, while the House was in session a year ago. It was made at a time when the authority of the Legislature could have been obtained. It could have been put in the Estimates. I do not think I am giving away any secret when I say that it was done rather against the Provincial Auditor, that he opposed it for a time and finally gave way. That of course, is entirely contrary to principle. If it was an emergency, between sessions, there might be some excuse for it, but when an expenditure of this kind, of nearly \$35,000 was made while the House was in session and while authority might have been secured there is very little excuse. It is a pity that a thing of this kind, which is for a good purpose should not have been done with the proper formality.

Premier Saunders: We had a very fine precedent by my hon. friend who expended over \$200,000 without any authority of this House, for highways.

Mr. Stewart: That is not the same at all.

Premier Saunders: Oh yes, and you had no vote of the House. We put through an Order in Council for this.

Mr. Stewart: When did you put through an Order in Council?

Premier Saunders: I can't recall the date, but you can take it that it was before the order was given.

Mr. Stewart: So that Order in Council was passed while this House was in session?

Premier Saunders: Yes, before the order was given.

Mr. Stewart: Then authority could have been obtained during a session of Parliament. That is surely without precedent.

Premier Saunders: Why did you practice the same thing yourself?
