INTERESTING FIXTURE.— Arrangements are being made for an interesting cricket match between two local clubs, the Abegweits and the Phoenix C. C. Sometime ago teams representing these two clubs met at Victoria Park and the Abegweits scored a victory on the first innings. The game that is to be played now is a return to that and both teams are keen upon winning. Each club will endeavor to put its best team on the field. The game is likely to take place on Saturday next week.

Many improvements have taken place in the telegraph service of this province during the past year, including the laying of a new cable, extension of the Night Letter privilege, concentration of the staff in Charlottetown for relaying purposes, etc; but by far the most important addition to the service has been the recent addition of a "duplexing" apparatus whereby it is possible to simultaneously transmit two messages, one in each direction over the same cable. Thus it will be seen that although the province is not really connected with the mainland by two submarine cables, yet the single cable has been so equipped that it is possible to have the existing lines do the work of two cables, thereby increasing the capacity for handling traffic by one

hundred per cent. The great advantage the province in general will derive from this system will be understood when it is explained that in future a message "relayed" to Charlottetown from any outside office or filed in the City, will be transmitted to St. John, N. B., direct within two or three minutes of its receipt in Charlottetown. The installation of this system has been somewhat expensive, but Mr. A. E. Morrison, Manager for Prince Edward Island hopes that the increase in business will warrant its continuance in operation.

The apparatus, which has never before been tried on the P. E. Island cable, was installed by Mr. J. M. Murley, Chief Operator. With the inauguration of this service communication with the mainland was brought to the highest possible state of efficiency and speed.

MR. WM. WAYE.—The funeral of the late William Waye of Hunter River took place on Saturday, Aug. 30th, to Hunter River cemetery, being very largely attended. Deceased, who passed away on the 27th ult. was in his 83rd year and was one of the pioneers of that section and was highly respected by all. He leaves to mourn a widow, four daughters and four sons. One of his daughters is Mrs. George Muford of this city. The pall-bearers were his four sons Fred, Robert, James and George; Jacob Smith and George Muford.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE.—The Cornwall-York Women's Institute held their regular meeting in the Cornwall schoolhouse on Monday afternoon. The subject for the meeting was "Poultry raising, and the care of eggs." Mr. T. A. Benson, the Poultry Expert, was present and gave an excellent address. He explained fully the benefits to be derived from having an Egg Circle in the district. It is to be regretted that more of the members were not present to hear Mr. Benson. The subject selected for the next meeting was "Bread Making," the meeting to be held in the Cornwall Schoolhouse on Oct. 6th.

AUTOS BRING BUSINESS.—At the meeting held on the lawn of the Cliff Hotel on Wednesday in connection with the automobile picnic given to the farmers of the Union Road Mr. J. Davies, Jr., the proprietor of the Cliff, who was one of the speakers, gave some interesting information, with regard to the effect which the running of automobiles has had on the business of that establishment. He said that they had been the greatest boon to the hotel, to which over five hundred people had gone this Summer. If it were not for the autos and the increased business that they brought, he stated, he would not have been able to keep the Cliff open during the month of August. Mr. Davies made the further important statement that all the provisions for the Cliff were bought from the farmers in the vicinity. The point of this remark did not escape the audience, and at the conclusion of the speeches three cheers were given for the proprietor of the Cliff.

ROAD IMPROVEMENT.—The farmers of the Union Road along which the automobiles are allowed to run while they have no objection to those vehicles are combined in their desire to see the road widened and otherwise improved. In their desire the automobiles are at one with them. It may be stated that work in that direction has already been commenced. A concrete culvert is being put in at Conley's Corner, and similar culverts are to be put down. The trees at the side of the road are to be cut down, and the road put into condition and properly drained for the Spring freshets, and then next year, the permanent work on it will be done, Mr. George Auld at the auto picnic for the farmers of the Union Road on Wednesday gave a guarantee that the work of improving the road would be performed. While Mr. R. H. Sterns, who also assured the farmers that the road would be improved, said that when the work was done the road would be one of the finest in the Province.

GRATIFYING.—In a brief chat yesterday with a Guardian representative with regard to the state of the health of the city, Dr. H. D. Johnston, the Health Officer of Charlottetown, made the interesting and gratifying statement that the health conditions were eminently satisfactory. There have been this year, he said, far fewer cases of typhoid fever than usually is the case. Typhoid, he explained, usually was prevalent during the Summer months, and in years gone by it was an occurrence of ordinary character for there to be thirty or forty cases of typhoid fever in the city. One year indeed, not long ago either, there had been as many as fifty-seven cases of typhoid. But this year, during the period when it usually makes its appearance, the Summer season, there have been only three cases of this disease in Charlottetown. "This shows on the one hand," said Dr. Johnston, "that sanitary arrangements are better attended to; that the yards are being kept cleaner, as this class of disease is due to dirty yards and that sort of thing. The Sanitary officers have been attending to their work in a proper and satisfactory manner, and getting residents to keep their places clean. On the other hand the cooler weather than usual we have had this Summer, especially in July, has been responsible also for the scarcity of typhoid, which is more prevalent in hot weather and hot climates."

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—The contract for section three of the new Welland ship canal was let at the Cabinet Council today to the firm of O'Brien and Dopeny, Montreal.

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—Eleven European nations have filed formal protests against the provisional bill granting a 5 per cent reduction of the duty on merchandise imported into this country in American vessels.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—The Democratic leaders of Senate will begin a supreme effort to-morrow to complicate the Tariff Bill and pass it before the adjournment on Saturday. A compromise on the income tax, representing a further concession to the insurgent advocates of an increase on large incomes was drafted by Senators Williams and Simmons.

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Hugh Dopeny of Montreal. The first section of the new canal, which runs along ten mile creek and takes in Ontario, is already under contract for Dominion dredging. Section two is advertised as beginning next week. Plans and specifications have been submitted to the Harbor Commission Montreal, for the Marine department's two new freight sheds at sections 24 and 25, Montreal, at a cost of \$300,000. Shed number 24 is to be 275 feet long and 106 feet wide and two stories high while shed 25 will be 185 feet long and 112 feet wide. The foundation alone costs \$100,000 and will be laid this year, while the general construction will be completed in early spring and will be available for business next navigation season.
